THE TEXT OF THE CHARGES.

The text of the Gagey charges has been published, and the charges are as direct and detailed as could be desired, points out the Ottawa Citizen, besides being somewhat more comprehensive than the original statement so as to bring the whole matter within the purview of the court. It will be remembered that the Government, in drafting the instructions to the judges, sought to narrow the scope of the enquiry by making it necessary that a written charge should be lodged by a member of the legislature against a minister before any evidence connecting him with the Gagey case could be admitted. The charges of Mr. Gagey have been cleverly drawn so as to include all the members of the Cabinet and would appear to have checked the effort of the Government to narrow the scope of the enquiry. Conspiracy on the part of the Cabinet is alleged, not only to bribe members, but to prostitute the constituencies in the by-elections through the medium of the machine. So comprehensive, and at the same time so detailed, are the charges that it would appear likely that the prosecution can secure the examination under oath of most of the witnesses whose testimony is desired.

For the Liberal papers that have been alleging that when called upon to definitely formulate his charges Mr. Gagey would not be prepared to prove as much as he alleged on the floor of the House, the document is a shock. Already the Toronto Star declares that they are beyond the scope of the instructions to the judges, and it is possible that an attempt may be made to shut some of them out on that ground, but it is unlikely that it will be successful. The main point is that Mr. Gagey has been as good as his word. He makes the charges boldly and definitely and now the public has only to wait the hearing of the evidence next week to decide whether this straightforward arraignment of the Cabinet of a province is a piece of senseless fabrication which could only result upon the head of the man who is the author of it, or a series of facts which will prove the Government to be the most corrupt and shameless that has ever disgraced the high position of advisers of the Crown.

You will observe that up to the present point R. R. Gagey, M. P., has been as good as his word. Now for the evidence under oath, with the people for the jury.

GOVERNMENT BY COMMITTEE.

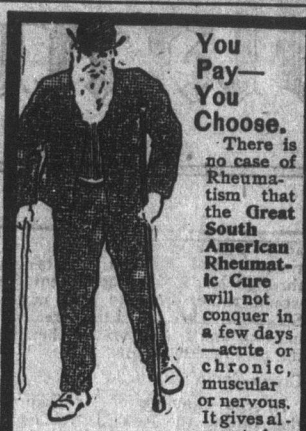

When we have government by parliament, then the decisions of the cabinet council are only proposals to the governing body; and the real discussion as to whether they shall be accepted or rejected goes on in open session in the presence of the whole country. But when parliament surrenders its mandate to govern to the cabinet, and does no more than formally register the decisions of the cabinet with an empty accompaniment of sham discussion, very like a stage duel, then the debates within the privy council chamber become the only real discussions of the measures which parliament finally passes; and from these debates the public is excluded.

The civil service commission receives a number of curious answers to the questions put to applicants for positions in the government service, but it is believed that the answer recently made by an applicant for a position as a draftsman in the engineer service is way beyond anything that was ever heard before by any of the examiners, says the Washington Star. At present writing a series of articles for a New York magazine. Not afraid of heat or cold from exposure. Not afraid of wild animals, microbes, men, political parties or work. Can swim any river in the United States. Expert with shotgun, can also shoot rifle. Can endure fatigue and exposure. Can handle gangs of men.
