International Bible Lesson for Tomorrow—Jesus rejected at Nazareth—Luke 4, 16-30.

Golden Text—"He came unto His own and His own received Him not."

We find Jesus in this lesson in the very town where He had grown up, in favor with God and man, until, he was 30. One of the devout customs of this holy Jewish carpenter was to attend the place of prayer every Sabbath and to unite in the public worship of God and the reading of His word, and not attracted by eloquence or sweet song. He reads from the scroll of Isaiah, written 700 years before, and applies it to Himself and His mission, as a servant of men—not as a ruler. The grace of His speech caused his townsmen to wonder, but not to repent or believe. He knew "no prophet is accepted in his own country," therefore they would reject Him; our unbelief and impotence can frustrate grace, but cannot escape the day of vengeance of our God.

While Israel's unbelief rejected Elijah and Elisha, the starving Gentile widow was fed from a full barrel of flour and the leprous Naaman was healed miraculously through a faith God's own people did not possess, and so Jesus would have to turn from Nazareth, though He, as mechanic, had done lots of work for their houses. He could do nothing for their hearts. They were filled with murderous wrath and would have killed Him. But His hour was not yet come. He is immortal till God's time for the cross, so passing through the midst of them He went His way; their little synagogue had heard His last sermon. How soon this may be our condition God only knows.

"Accept the dear Saviour to-day, There's danger and death in delay."

Unionism...

A Former Chathamite....

The following is taken from the Fashionable Cutter and Tailors' Gazette, and was written by a former Chathamite, who is well known to many in town.

We now have another ism agitating the entire world, it is so shaking the base of our commercial foundation that the whole structure is trembling in the balance. The retreating foe of the past is now the aggressive participant wielding its mighty sword to the right and left, cutting down all those who obstruct their path.

"yea even savoring their own heads in their eagerness to conquer the enemy," but it is now as follows, "Haste makes waste." The retreating foe is gradually drawing its lines to a focus, searing bands are reuniting and will eventually prepare an ambuscade into which the pursuing army will dash headlong, unable to defend themselves from being unmercifully massacred and left destitute upon the field maimed and weakened.

This is the warfare existing now between labor and capital, or in other words Trade Unions against Commercial Corporations.

I wish that I were powerful enough to stop the mad rush, "that by a lifted hand I could hold both parties in calm silence for a few moments," that they could be brought together, not as foes, but as friends, convening for the good of all.

I am not against trade unions, on the contrary I am with them, but I am also with the business man.

Let us first look at the word UNION. What is the meaning of this mighty word? Taking recourse to Webster, we obtain this definition: "A union is a combination of forces banded together for some specific purpose and for the good of all. Now, is this what the various unions are doing? Are they not on the contrary joining their hands and attempting to force their employer to run his business to suit themselves? It is one thing to lead a horse to water but it is another to make him drink, especially if his natural instincts warn him that the water is impure. Just so with the business man, in the clearest of vision he may be able to see that higher wages and shorter hours would prove beneficial to all concerned, but if in signing this agreement he is also forced to sign away his rights as an employer, "to hire those he desires" and to conduct his business as he sees fit, it is then the pill is too bitter to swallow, and in natural pride he openly avows warfare against such injustice. No one concerned is so far sighted as a man who has worked his way up from the first rung, who has studied every detail and knows the requirements of his fellow workmen.

Let those who belong to unions study carefully the meaning of their organization, let them draft measures that are needed but that are synonymous of this meaning and then present this petition in due form to their employer and I will readily wager that they will never stand before a more appreciative audience.
