- 8 Clinical Medicine.-[Prof. Ross.]-Attendance is given in the Medical Wards of the Montreal General Hospital on three days of every week. Accurate eports of all cases are kept by duly appointed clinical clerks, and are systematially read before the class. Instruction is given by the bedside, and special induceents are offered to every pupil to take part in the physical examination of patients. ourses he mode of conducting investigations, the use of the microscope, the value of the termometer and ophthalmoscope, etc., in Medical Diagnosis, are all explained and ollecte linstrated. Senior Students are called upon in rotation to examine new cases beinstrated. Senior Students are content of the state of their general knowledge. Elition, one weekly Clinical Lecture is delivered, bearing upon some case or cases l speci importance which may happen to be under observation at the time. fore the tention is directed to Medical Anatomy, and candidates for the degree will be hamined thereon.
 - 9 Surgery .- [Prof. Fenwick.] Divided into Principles and Practice, includ-Surgical Anatomy and Operative Surgery, exhibited on the subject. The rious surgical instruments and apparatus are exhibited, and their uses and applitions explained and practically illustrated.
 - 10 Clinical Surgery. -[Prof. Roddick.] This course is eminently practical, esiting of bedside instruction and lectures delivered weekly, illustrative of Suralcases actually present in the wards of the General Hospital. hen charge of by the Teacher on alternate days, when the reports of the Clinical eks are read and criticized, and fresh cases examined by the senior Students. Surgical dressings are, as much as possible, reserved for these occasions, so to give all present an opportunity of participating in the application of splints inctures, dressing of wounds, minor operations, etc. Major operations are pered in the spacious theatre attached to the Hospital, which is so admirably emeted that the most distant can generally obtain a fair view of the operation. hlis Esis also used as a Lecture Room by the Clinical Professors. All of the recently tated appliances for the treatment of Surgical disease have been introduced into llospital, prominent among which is a complete outfit of Lister's Antisentic grantus, so that this excellent method of treating wounds is now almost univer-Eradopted.
