Besides the horses already reported, he purchased two colts from Mr. James Picken, Torre, Kirkcudbright, one of which has gone with the others, and another follows later That now despatched was a yearling, bred by Mr. David A. Hood, Balgreddan, and got by the big, well-bred horse Flashwood's Rest, a son of the renowned champion horse Flashwood (3504), out of the prize mare Miss Riddell, a daughter of the good breeding horse Buxom Lad (7533), the sire of Mr. Riddell's fine three-year-old mare Camilla, which bore off champion honors at Dumbarton and Paisley, and was reserve champion at the Highland. This colt is full of the best Darnley blood, both Flashwood and Buxom Lad being got by that celebrated horse, and hence he is likely to be an impressive sire and good horse for improving the stock of a district in Canada. The other colt bought from Mr. Picken was bred by Mr. Robert Picken at Laigh Langelde, Craigie, and was got by the champion Prince Alexander (8399), out of the beautiful prise mare Fanoy Fair, by Sir Michael (1530), and on the dam's side descended from the noted Barlae Doll. This colt won several prizes when in his breeder's hands, and is a thick, well-built animal, like the tribe to which he belongs, with the best of ribs, and good feet and legs.
