To the pupil's events have been added two events open to male Public School Teachers of the Province, namely:

1—100 yard Dash.  
2—220 yard Dash.

Entries for the above events must be in the Secretary's hands by May 14.

The committee in charge hope to receive donations of cups and medals as first and second prizes from some of the citizens of the Province who are interested in the physical development of Public School pupils. Announcement in regard to this will be made at a later date.

The Principals' Association of St. Catharines desires the hearty co-operation of every Public School teacher and every School Board in the Province to make the Athletic Meet a success. ### BROADWAY LISTENS TO RUMOR THAT GEORGES MAY DODGE FIGHT

NEW YORK, March 15.—Broadway heard rumors today that Georges Carpentier is getting ready to run out of his match with Jack Dempsey.

The failure of the Frenchmen to get their forfeit over here to rest alongside of Tex Richard's and Jack Dempsey's "good faith money" is taken by some to mean that the pedal extremities of the European champion are beginning to cool.

Again, it is said that Carpentier was willing to be matched for \$200,000, but his wife will not consent to have him ruined for a cent less, it being reported that Richard asked him to lessen his fees.

Just a week ago, Descamps, the Frenchman's manager, said he would comply with Richard's suggestion that their forfeit money be posted on this side. The skeptics should not be alarmed because the money has not arrived in seven days. The Frenchmen are on a tour of Europe and they cannot attend to business with the celerity possible if they were at home in Paris. Besides, Frenchmen never see the need of a rush,

and the date of the meeting is months away.

In regard to the reduction of the purse, Richard told the United Press recently that he had not suggested a price cut to Carpentier or had not asked to have him work on a percentage basis.

He intimated that he might ask him to work for a "cut of the gate" when he came to this country, feeling that much more could be accomplished by conversation than by cable.

Gus Wilson, Carpentier's trainer, who is waiting over in Jersey City for his employer to return, laughed at the tears that Carpentier will slip out of the nose.

"Carpentier has been working all his life for this bout. He never will consent to having it called off, let alone trying to get out of it himself," he said. "Descamps thinks that Dempsey is trying to get away from the agreement, and he writes me that he will start legal proceedings to collect the forfeits just as soon as any part of the agreement is violated."

### Gives Points to Worthy Mrs Jiggs

SYDNEY MINES, N.S., March 15.—When Robert Keenan, janitor of the public school here, reproved a pupil for rudeness he received a note from Mrs. James Smith, the boy's mother, asking him to call at her home. Keenan did so, and after he had entered Mrs. Smith locked the door, felled him with a potato smasher, broke a crock of butter milk over his head, doused him with a pail of dirty water and then ejected him from the house. This morning

Mrs. Smith was fined \$20 in the police court for assaulting Keenan, with an alternative of two months in jail. She chose the jail term, but friends refused to let her go to prison and paid the fine.

### SEEKING UNITY AMONG VETERANS

OTTAWA, March 15.—There is now a proposal before the G.W.V.A. dominion command, from the Grand Army of United Veterans, that all Canadian veterans' societies and associations shall unite for certain purposes into one grand organization.

A letter was received to-day by C. G. MacNeill, secretary of the dominion command, from J. F. Marsh, who, with Sergeant W. L. Raymond, V.C., is coming to Ottawa to make representations before the parliamentary committee, on behalf of the G.A.U.V. Mr. Marsh suggested that all representations agreed upon to be made to the parliamentary committee shall be made not by any one veterans' association, but shall come from a joint committee representing all veterans' associations, and thus will gain more force and weight.

The suggestion, it is understood, has been received in a most favorable spirit by the G.W.V.A. and will be placed before the various provincial commands for an expression of opinion as to its practicality and the means by which it shall be carried out.

Mateo gave the name of his accomplice as Ramon Casanova who, is being sought by the police. He warned the police to beware of Casanova, who, he asserted, had a camera filled with explosives.

DETROIT, Mich., March 15.—John Dodge, Jr., son of the late John Dodge, Detroit automobile manufacturer, who was cut off in the will of his father with only \$150 a month, will get \$2,000,000 of the estate.
