HEAVY SESSION TOWNSHIP COUNCIL

The Councillors Dispose of Several Important Matters of Business on Monday

The Brantford Township Council held their monthly session yesterday at the Court House.

The morning session was taken up by the Council as a Court of Revision in deciding on the appeals against the 1913 assessment when some 24 appeals were dealt with.

The afternoon session was devoted to receiving deputations, passing accounts and dealing with other matters.

Taxes Remitted. Owing to the dispute as to whether the property of Mrs. James Humphreys is located in the Township of Brantford, a motion was carried that the taxes against the property amounting to \$7.71 be remitted.

Echo Place Deputation. A deputation from Echo Place composed of Messrs. J. J. Burke, Edmondson and George D. Hall, presented a petition asking the council to build a sidewalk under the local improvement plan. Messrs. Barton and Gress opposed the building of the walk under the improvement plan, preferring to pay for the walk under the old system, the township, two-thirds and the owners one-third in cash. They also pointed out the fact that to put the sidewalk in proper position on the north side of the road would require the cutting down of a large embankment opposite one of the properties and the building of a dam to retain the water on the opposite another property.

The expense of this work would, of course be added to the expense of building the entire sidewalk; also the owners of the properties adjoining the cutting and the building of the dam would be liable for the expense of the dam to be built to retain the water on the opposite another property.
