ASYLUMS ARE OVER POPULATED

Not Enough Accommodation in Ontario For Feeble Minded People.

Rogers, inspector of prisons and hospitals in a report just laid before Hon. W. J. Hanna who is taking the matter up with a view to finding a remedy for the existing conditions of things.
