COLBORNE STREET MITE BOX CONCERT

Over \$1900 Received Into Church Coffers Yesterday

The congregation of Colborne St. Methodist Church held their annual Mite Box concert in the church last evening which was well attended.

Yesterday afternoon and evening, until about eight o'clock, the church finance committee were busy accepting the contributions brought in by the congregation and at eight o'clock \$1,908.24 had been collected, \$1500 of which will be applied upon the mortgage of \$9,500 on the church, incurred several years ago for church improvement, leaving a balance of \$8,000 still owing by the church. Some who have boxes, but have not turned them in yet, are expected to make returns in a day or so, which will do doubt bring the total up to \$2,000.

Mr. Cyril Hayes of London was the entertainer for the evening. Mr. Hayes is a dramatic reader of exceptional ability, having the power to assume different characters at will and seemingly without effort. Mr. Hayes gave several readings last evening, among which were selections from Dickens' Christmas Carol, Revenge by Tennyson and The Bells, by Egan, Allen Poe, and A Waterloo Hero. After almost every number Mr. Hayes was required to respond to an encore.

During the evening, Mr. G. C. White, the church organist gave an organ solo overture to "Stradella" by Auber.

The choir sang two anthems, "Hallelujah Chorus" and "The Song of Thanksgiving." A male quartette composed of Messrs. Ayliffe, Sills, Smith and Hills sang "Four Jolly Smiths" and "The Rosary" with obligato solo by Miss Agnes Butler. Mr. J. E. Hills sang "The Bell Light-house Tower" very pleasingly. Dr. Hanna was the chairman.

Vouchers for mite boxes for the coming year were received which with quite a number more which are expected to be received in a few days, will make as good a showing next year as this.

ENJOYABLE EVENING AT CONGREGATIONAL

Anniversary Was Celebrated by a Social Tea and Concert.

In connection with Anniversary services at the Congregational church a very pleasant and profitable time was spent by a large number of members and friends who gathered in the church parlors last evening. A cafeteria tea followed the splendid program.

Rev. Mr. Kelly, the pastor of the church who occupied the chair, gave a splendid outline of the history of the church which has enjoyed much prosperity.

In 1828 the Sunday school was organized and in 1835 the church was erected. The present building was organized in 1864, having been preceded by a structure on Dalhousie street near Charlotte St, which burned down. The church organization enjoys the distinction of being one of the oldest, if not the oldest church in the city. Dr. Lily (deceased), was the first pastor. He afterwards became principal of the Congregational College of Canada.

A very pleasing part of the programme was the presentation of a bouquet to Mrs. Wisner and Mrs. Wilkes, who have the honor of having been connected with the church the longest period. Mrs. Wilkes has been connected with the congregation since 1852 and Mrs. Wisner since 1857.

Much enjoyed readings were given by Miss Ethel Dixon, Mr. Cole and Mr. Macklem. A solo was very acceptably rendered by Mr. Roland the Hollinrake; also a duet by Mr. Kelso and Mr. Fennell.

The evening's programme was made still more enjoyable by lantern slides, miscellaneous views were shown and the songs were illustrated. An instrumental duet rendered by Misses Ethel Dixon and Grace Adams was a splendid number on the programme.

The arranging of the programme was in the hands of a committee of which Mr. J. L. Dixon was chairman. The refreshment booth presided over by the Ladies did a splendid business. A very gratifying amount was added to the Church Improvement fund.

Throughout its history the church has enjoyed much prosperity and has been the channel through which untold work has been done for the cause. The church has enjoyed the services of the best of pastors. Under the present pastor the good work has gone ahead exceedingly well.

Lady's Kimono

The novel feature of this kimono is the cut of yoke and sleeves in one piece. The sleeves are of bishop shape, full at the wrist, but they may be made elbow length if preferred. The skirt sections of the kimono are fairly full, the neck trimmed with an ornamental collar and the closing slightly bias. Silk or cotton crepe, figured Japanese silk, French flannel and similar fabrics are suitable for a kimono.

The kimono pattern, No. 6419, is cut in sizes 34 to 42 inches bust measure. Medium size requires 5 1/2 yards of 38 inch material, with 1/2 yard of 27 inch extra trim.

Anderson, Commander of the expedition which reported the luk did not reach Herchel was last seen off Flaxman about August 24th. This was dated November 1, 1906, when Stefansson was sent in Collinson Bay. He said:
