MR. KELLETT WRITES.

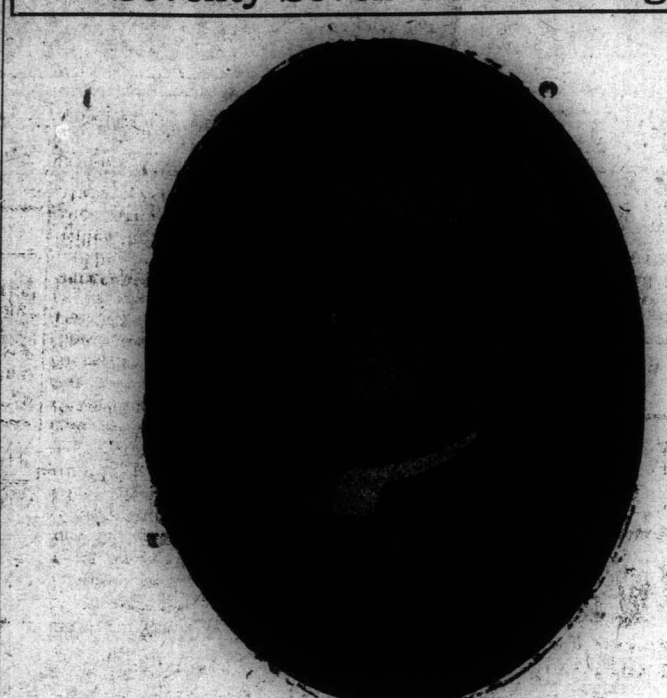
The Editor Daily Courier, City.

Sir,—The statements made in the daily press that the work being done by The Lake Erie and Northern Railway Company at the canal head-gates will endanger the embankment at this point are absolutely absurd and can be shown so to any one wishing to study the Company's plans for the embankment at this point.

The work being done consists of a heavy masonry abutment together with heavy timber crib-work on both the river and canal sides of Green-wich street, considerably widening and strengthening the present embankment, in fact, making this point absolutely safe and permanent.

The statement has been made that this is one of the weakest points in the city's system of dykes, a point which has always caused considerable anxiety to the city officials, in view of the great damage which might be done should the river break through at this point.

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In spite of this supposed anxiety and the millions of dollars of property which are said to be endangered by this weak point in the city, to the best of my knowledge, spent practically no money in strengthening this embankment or placing permanent works at this point.

All of this permanent work is now being done by the Lake Erie and Northern Railway Company at its own expense. This work has been proceeded with as rapidly as it is possible to do so, as many men being employed as can work to advantage.

As to the objections taken to the new channel cut through the island; the area of the channel at present is considerably in excess of the area of the old channel, which has been filled in. It is impossible at the present time to deepen this channel except with special machinery. This machinery has been ordered by the company and is now in the yards of the Lake Erie and Northern Railway Messrs. Johnson Bros., general contractors, have resumed tracklaying on the Lake Erie & Northern railway, and it is expected within four weeks at the outside that steel will be laid from Galt to Jubilee Terrace, when it will be possible to bring this machinery from Galt and place it at work deepening the channel to the satisfaction of the city authorities.

In the meantime we would ask a little more consideration from the city officials with respect to the work being done by this company, every effort being made by us to prosecute the work as rapidly as possible.
