TO WORK ON NEW FACTORY

Hamilton Spectator:—F. J. BANTAM BATTALION

About 16 Brantford members of the 216th Bantam Battalion arrived in the city last night. The men are well pleased with Camp Borden, the organization of which is rapidly nearing perfection. They say the much talked of sand nuisance is now practically a negligible matter. The battalion has reached a strength of 800 and is still continuing its search for recruits, in which connection recruiting sergeant J. Haley is expected in the city this morning. The men expect to leave Camp Borden about the end of the month for Toronto, where they will be quartered the coming winter.

NAVY RECRUITS.

It is expected that Canada will have contributed two thousand recruits at least for the royal navy, by the end of the year, under the arrangement announced by Hon. J. D. Hazen on Wednesday in Toronto. The plan agreed upon between the Canadian government and the admiralty provides for a maximum of five thousand men. They will be recruited in Canada and sent to England for the major part of their training.

THE MARKET

The fruit season is now only commencing to gain its own, and this morning fruit was predominant everywhere. Peaches, plums, grapes and apples were in abundance, selling at fairly moderate prices. Tomatoes still continue plentiful, and corn was more in evidence than before this season, while eggs remain stationary at 32 cents per dozen, but still continues to soar, and this morning reached the figure of 40 cents.

A HOSPITAL WARD

To Be Furnished By Institute Women of Brant County.

Successful Meeting of Women's Hospital Aid.

The Women's Hospital Aid assumed activities after two months of vacation, on Friday morning, the meeting, which was well attended by many members from both city and county, was held in the board room of the Public Library, with the President, Mrs. Schell, in the chair. The Secretary and Treasurer presented their reports, which were adopted.

Total receipts of Rose Day, to date, were \$225.93, and expenses \$153.00. Mrs. Brethour, District President, of the Women's Institutes of South Brant, then addressed the meeting, expressing full sympathy with the work of the W.H.A. and the hospital, and advocated more work for the local hospital throughout the county.

Appreciation of this splendid gift was shown by applause and a vote of thanks to Mrs. Brethour and to the S. B. W. I.'s was moved by Mrs. Cummings Nelles, seconded by Mrs. Jackson, and carried unanimously. The resignation of Mrs. David Taylor, collector for Scotland district was reported, and a vote of thanks and appreciation for her years of work was passed unanimously. The secretary to send a copy of resolution to Mrs. Taylor.

The President referred to the passing of the Hospital by-law on June 25th with the pleasure that the W. H. A. members had done their part so effectively. Mrs. Morgan Harris reported for the visitors at the Hospital in June, that she, in company with Mesdames Cook, McPherson and Goetz, all of Mt. Pleasant, had made visits each week and had taken up readings of fruit, flowers and dainties suitable for the sick and that the patients seemed pleased with the care and kindness shown them and were as happy and as contented as possible under the circumstances.

Mrs. Mitchell, assisted by Mrs. Mitchell, junior, visited in July and reported similarly to the above. Mrs. Sanderson, President of the H. A. stated that a successful garden tea had been held by the young ladies, which had netted \$75. Mrs. Hurley, convener for the County, reported that the fourth fair and several other places must be appointed.

DEPUTATION IS HIGHLY PLEASED

With the Brant Sanatorium and Its Surroundings.

Comments of Appreciation with Regard Thereto.

The Kitchener News-Record has some very complimentary things to say with regard to the recent visit of a deputation from that place to Brantford and the Brantford Sanatorium. The paper in question deprecates the information which might be used in the management of city's hospital at Freeport.

On Wednesday afternoon five members of the Sanatorium Board—Dr. J. P. Honsberger, J. A. Lang, E. D. Lang, E. W. Lamprey and W. V. Utley—visited the Brant Tuberculosis Sanatorium at Brantford, in search of information which might be used in the management of city's hospital at Freeport.

Mr. J. Williamson, of the Brantford Starch Company, a business friend of Mr. J. A. Lang and Chairman of Brantford's Industrial Committee met the party at the depot and acted as host. He provided an automobile to convey the party to and from the Sanatorium, entertaining them to supper at the Bodega Tavern and afterwards showed them the many points of interest in that up-to-date place. The telephone City has a magnificent Y.M.C.A. erected at a cost of \$155,000; a new library, a peach of a park in the heart of the city, containing Brant's monument; a new post-office whose cost equaled the Y. M. C. A. and many smart business structures. A monument to Graham Bell, the inventor of the telephone, is under construction.

The deputation was well repaid by the visit and gathered information which will be of good service here. The News-Record, through the courtesy of the Brantford Courier, was able to present three views of the Brant Sanatorium and an interesting story of the good work being carried on in that city.

Miss Kathleen B. Summers, the superintendent, who is both a highly intelligent and tactful lady, was very ready to impart details of the system and management, and the delegation appreciated the reception tendered them.

The News-Record also devotes an editorial to the visit and says in part: "There is an abundance of evidence to show that the Brant Sanatorium for the treatment of persons suffering from tuberculosis in its different stages is performing a valuable work."

At present it has sixteen patients. Two boys of ten or twelve years of age; young men and several girls in their teens; men and women of middle life and older. And they are nursing them back to health, slowly perhaps in some instances, but seemingly surely by all.

"Complete rest, fresh air, simple foods, such as milk, eggs and fruit, are furnished in abundance, and the relatives to visit them frequently all figure in the healing of the diseased lung tissues and the regaining of health and strength. It was stated by the lady superintendent that several young men who had been treated at the Brant Sanatorium had recovered so completely that they were able to enlist as soldiers for overseas service."

Any one who has visited a house where an afflicted person lay, has sensed the odor of the affliction in the air. In a sanatorium, such as the one at Brantford, there is none of this. The atmosphere is pure and wholesome and everything is a spick and span as the dining room of a good home. They might seem to be tired patients taking a cure. The great accomplishment is that tuberculosis patients recover health."

NEWS FROM OVERSEAS

Items of More or Less Interest From Great Britain

The late Fredk. Andrew, a prominent lawyer of Lincoln, left an estate exceeding \$1,000,000 in value. Besides other charitable legacies he bequeathed to the Solicitors' Benevolent Association 1,000 fully paid Ordinary shares of \$50 each in Robey and Co., Limited, engineers, Lincoln, to found annuities in memory of his late father. The whole of the residuary estate is left upon trust to found and endow a convalescent home for "poor gentlemen honestly striving to earn their own livelihood either as teachers of music, or languages, artists, authors, schoolmistresses, trained hospital nurses, clerks in the Civil Service, or in any other similar manner" to be called "The Frederick Andrew Convalescent Home."

Hara-Kari, the Japanese method of self-destruction was performed in London recently by a gentleman named Macjiro Tamura, a major in the Japanese army, who had lately come to England to learn the language. General despondency on account of his inability to pick up English quickly is said to have been responsible for the act. The instrument used was a razor, but the deceased had used it on his person so savagely that the blade was broken, and the body was found with a gaping wound across the neck, reaching to the spine, and as if not satisfied as to the sufficiency of this he had

inflicted a second wound seven and a half inches long on the abdomen just below the navel.

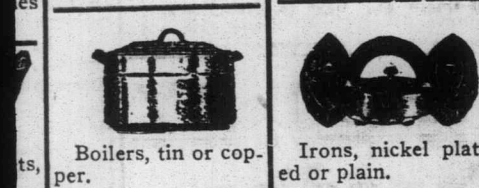
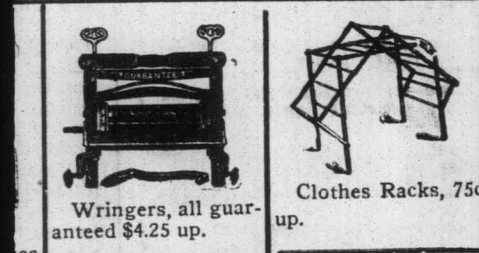
