## U.S. NO LONGER NEUTRAL IN WORLD'S GREAT WAR

America Enters Conflict Between Civilization and Barbarism, Says Premier Ribot; Other Neutrals Must Follow Lead of U. S., Says Brazil

Paris, April 5.—"We all have the feeling that something great, surpassing the proportions of a political event, has just been accomplished," said Premier Ribot in an address today in the Chamber of Deputies. "Entrance into the war with us of the most pacific democracy in the world, is an historic fact without equal."

The premier's address was delivered in the presence of members of the diplomatic corps. The ministerial benches and members seats were filled and the galleries were crowded.

"After having done the very thing to demonstrate to us its attachment to peace," M. Ribot continued, "the great American nation solemnly declares it cannot remain neutral in this conflict between right and violence, between civilization and barbarism."

Rome, April 5.—via Paris.—"President Wilson's message to Congress is an accusation from the civilized world against the barbarism of Prussian militarism," says The Messagero.

The Popolo Romano says it does not understand the distinction made by President Wilson between the German Government and the German people, since German public opinion

urged the submarine war, which was approved by the reichstag which is elected by universal suffrage. The Observatore Romano, the Vatican organ, says of President Wilson's address to Congress: "The man who last December championed peace to-day champions a vast war, and is leading the new world to participate in the horrors of the greatest human butchery ever witnessed by the old world."

Neutrality No More  
Rio Janeiro, April 5.—O Faiz says that the beginning of the end approaches and that neutrals can no longer remain neutral. "As Senator Ruy Barbosa has said," the paper continues, "there cannot be neutrality between the law and the force."

"The attitude of the United States will arouse enthusiasm throughout the world and other nations will arouse themselves for the chastisement of iniquitous Germany."

The entry of the United States into the war is the unavoidable consequence of the German policy. The entire world and above all the American continent applauds.

## WOUNDS DRESSED PAINLESSLY NOW

Celluloid Hospital in London Hospitals for that Purpose

SYSTEM INTRODUCED By Sir Almoth Wright, Noted Physician

One of the worst terrors of the wounded man in hospital—the often agonizing dressing of his healing wound—has been almost entirely removed by a little detail in technique introduced into the military wards of a London hospital by Sir Almoth Wright. The pain killing detail, for such it is, is the simple expedient of placing a very thin piece of perforated celluloid over the bare wound.

This drug is ordinary dressing is applied. The result is that instead of having to tear the lint away in dressing the wound, often an extremely painful process, the dressing comes away easily and quite painlessly.

The celluloid, which seems to be more holes than material, is first rendered soft and pliable by a soaking in a 2 per cent solution of carbolic acid, then washed in weak salt solution, and then laid directly on the raw, granulating surface. Fine lint soaked in a 5 per cent solution of common soda in sterile water is then placed over the celluloid, after which firm bandages are applied.

Owing to the celluloid much firmer pressure can be used than with ordinary dressings. Another interesting point is that practically no antiseptics are used in dressing the wounds.

"The wounds are kept wet with weak salt and water solution," the surgeon in charge told me, said a visitor to the hospital, "and that is all the local treatment they get. In addition, immediately on the patient's admission, we attempt to find out just what germs are present in the wound and the man is then inoculated with a serum prepared in the laboratory from this type of germ. We have proved experimentally that certain germs commonly found in wounds, while destroyed by strong antiseptic solutions such as carbolic, actually grow all the faster in very weak solutions such as are often formed in the depths of a wound when a little antiseptic has been diluted down with a large amount of the natural fluid of the body. Hence our practical discontinuance of the use of antiseptics and the substitution of the salt solution which, here at any rate, has been found to give much better results."

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## TRADES AND LABOR OPPOSE MILITARY SCHOOL TRAINING

Resolution of Protest Passed After Discussion Last Evening

Last night's meeting of the Trades and Labor Council was given over to a continuance of the discussion concerning the advisability of introducing military training into our public schools and colleges, that was commenced at the meeting last week. After some discussion, the following resolution was moved by Delegate Kite, and seconded by Delegate Moran:

"Whereas—Militarism is so widely denounced by neutral as well as by the majority of those belligerent countries at present engaged, as being the principle factor in causing this most terrible of all wars.

"And whereas—Great Britain and her Allies are sacrificing thousands of their best able-bodied men in an awful struggle to put down and do away with 'German Militarism' as a common foe for all time to come.

"And whereas—the encouraging of military training of any kind in our public schools or colleges is fostering this same demon that committed such inhuman and diabolical outrages in overrunning Serbia, Belgium and other countries in their lust for blood.

"And whereas—the inculcating of military jingoism into the minds of the children and sowing the seeds of hatred in their innocent hearts, crowds out all that God desires there, sunshine, love of man, kindness, love of flowers, unselfishness and to be forgiving.

"Be it therefore resolved that this council go on record as being decidedly opposed to military training of any kind in the public schools or colleges of this province."

The resolution was passed and copies will be sent to the local board of education, Principal Burt of the M.P.P., the Department of Education, Toronto, and the Ontario executive of the Dominion Trades Congress.

## To Establish New Consulate

London, April 5.—Germany will shortly establish a new consulate at Haparanda, on the Swedish coast of the Gulf of Bothnia, to deal principally with Russian business, according to a Stockholm dispatch to Reuters. The dispatch says that the plan is connected with negotiations regarding the release of civil prisoners in both countries, the numbers of whom aggregate more than 11,000.
