






"North of the Aisne the sit-nation in the sector between Brayen-Laonnois and Chavignon was not changed during the was not changed during the night. On the front, between Mont des Singes and Chavignon our troops made further pro-gress and reached Rohay Farm. The number of prisoners taken up to last night in this region exceeds 500.

"There were vigorous artillery engagements in the region of Cerny-en-Laonnois, especial-ly in the sector of Vauxmais-ons. We dispersed German pa-trols which attempted to ap-An attack on the Sapigneul bridgehead which the enemy made after a violent bombard-ment was repulsed.

ment was repulsed. "On the left bank of the Meuse there was heavy artillery fighting in the sector of Chame wood. In the region of Eparg-es we carried out a detailed op-eration which enabled us to bring back prisoners. "German aviators threw down two bombs on Nancy. There were no victims.

"During the night of October 24 twenty-five German airplanes were brought down by our pilots or fell disabled in the enemy lines." Start?
