Dollars for Wolves As the result of a special appropriation made during the last session of the Provincial Legislature, the Department of Agriculture is offering \$1,000 reward with a view to encourage the killing of the wolves which are such a tax on the sheep, poultry and cattle industries and so destructive to the game birds and large game in northern Saskatchewan. The principal prize is that offered for the greatest number of brush or timber wolves killed by one person, viz., \$150, while three prizes of \$100 each are offered for: 1st, greatest number of coyote skins shipped; 2nd, greatest number of brush or timber wolf skins shipped; 3rd, greatest number of coyotes killed by one person. Smaller prizes bring the total number offered to fifteen. Applications for any of the prizes, accompanied by the necessary proofs as set forth in the condi-tions published by the Government, must be received by the Department of Agriculture previous to 10th of April, when the prizes will be award-
