GREAT PITCHING RECORD.

Helena, Mont., July 23.—James H. Wiggs, of the Helena Pacific Northwest league team, by shutting out Seattle for the first five innings today, broke the world's record for consecutive shut-outs. Wiggs' record is forty-four innings without a run, exceeding that held by Chesbro, of Pittsburgh, by three innings.

Tacoma failed to score in the last three innings of its Helena game, while Wiggs shut Spokane out in two games, and Seattle, the leaders in the race, met with a like fate Tuesday and Thursday. To-day Wiggs shut Seattle out for five innings, and would have excelled his record but for errors behind him, which gave Seattle two runs. Helena, however, won in the tenth inning.

Wiggs came to Helena from Chicago this season. He is 6 feet 4 inches, and is said to exceed even Waddell in speed and variety of curves.

Wiggs is formerly of the London, Ont., International League, and played Chatham, losing his game here by his wildness, but the Chatham players were unable to hit when he got them over the top. Local fans will remember him as a tall, fair-haired fellow.

CHATHAM RINK WINNING.

London, July 24.—The Association competition of the Western Ontario Bowling tournament is now nearing a close. Six rinks have reached the fourth round, which will be played this afternoon, including the Chatham rink, skipped by Wilson Taylor. Dresden, Ridgeway and Blenheim also did well.

In the third round Chatham defeated St. Thomas 18-15, and Blenheim is playing Woodstock this morning. In the consolation match Sowerby's rink went down to London 18-20, and Bray's, after winning from Masurel, of London, 24-15, is drawn to play with Aylmer.

THE RING

ALL IS READY.

San Francisco, July 23.—Everything is now in readiness for the Jeffries-Fitzsimmons contest on Friday night, and the attendance promises to be the capacity of the arena.

It is not likely Jeffries will follow his usual routine of exercise from now on. He is at his best and will do just as he pleases. He is particularly partial to sprinting at this stage of the game, as he believes that by footing it over short stretches of highway he gains in speed and strengthens his wind. Jeffries is better natured than he was a week ago. He declares he feels stronger and better than he ever did before going into any fight and those who have been watching him during his training insist that he is faster than ever.

Fitzsimmons has also tapered off in his work, having passed the point where preliminary exercise will cut any figure. He says that hereafter he will do his boxing in private. After experiencing a temporary boom in betting circles Fitz's chances have receded in the estimation of spectators until the original odds of 10 to 1 now prevail.

SAGE HURT

The Aged Financier Lands Flat in Broadway—The Old Man Very Game.

New York, July 23.—Russell Sage fell off a Broadway car yesterday. Most octogenarians would have been seriously hurt by the fall, but Mr. Sage wasn't hurt at all, with the exception of a slight bruise on the leg and a little jarred feeling.

The accident happened in front of the Equitable building, where Mr. Sage had been attending a meeting of the Pacific Mail directors. He was accompanied by F. J. Menzie, who acts as his secretary. When they came out into Broadway the latter hailed a car to take Mr. Sage up to the Western Union building, where he always acts as the luncheon that is provided for officers of the company. The car stopped and Mr. Sage stepped on the footboard, assisted by his secretary. Before he got to the top of the car he pulled the bell and the car shot ahead.

The jerk caused Mr. Sage to lose his foothold on the step, but he managed to keep hold of the side rail with his hands, and he was thus pulled along for about 20 feet with his feet dragging on the ground. Many persons in the crowd on Broadway recognized Mr. Sage, and all of them thought that he was going to be badly hurt. His secretary rushed to his assistance, with several others. Before they or anyone on the car could get to him, Mr. Sage let go his hold and fell full length in the street beside the car, which in another moment came to a full stop.

Mr. Sage was assisted to his feet by half a dozen persons. His hat had fallen off and his clothes were awry. He was helped to the sidewalk, while the conductor took his name and address in case of a suit. Mr. Sage assured everyone that he was not hurt a bit. As soon as his clothes were brushed another car was stopped and he went up to the Western Union building on it.

He was back in his office before 3 o'clock, attending to business. His secretary, after telling the reporters about the accident, went back to find out what Mr. Sage had to say concerning his condition.

"Tell them I'm all right and too busy to see them," was the message he sent out.
