Eight Men Killed -A Fast Passenger Train Barely Saved From Plunging Into the Debris.

Fairmont, W. Va., January 9.—Yesterday morning at 7.28 o'clock extra east engine No. 230 with 23 empty cars met engine No. 359 light on the bridge crossing the mouth of Koon's Run above Everson section on the Monongabela division of the Baltimore & Ohio railroad, which is 25 feet above the back water of the Monongabela river, and collided Both engines were going at full speed, as the Pittsburg flyer was nearly due. Engine No. 359 was headed east but was running backwards and therefore going west.

The heavy engine went entirely through
the light one, and as the entire crew was
in the engine all were killed except Brakeman Tedroy, who was thrown into the
river. He will die. When the first crash
came Engineer-Richardson of the heavy
engine pushed his fireman, Murrell off at

collision occurring in the centre of the

Rochester Orphanage Horror Worst Than First Reported.

Awful Scenes Around the Burning Building - A Natural Gas Explosion Caused the Fire.

Rochester, N. Y., Jan. 9.—Twenty-eight dead bodies lie at the morgue and twelve others, more or less seriously injured, lie at the different hosously injured, lie at the different hos-pitals in the city, as a result of the terrible holocaust which occurred early yesterday inorming at the Roch-ester orphan asylum. Of the dead, 26 were children of both sexes, ranging im age from 2 to 14 years, while the remaining two were adults. The fire, which was discovered at 1.10 a. m., and was doubtless caused by an explosion of natural gas in the boiler room, ad-joining the west wing of the asylum. joining the west wing of the asylum, spread so rapidly that many of the 109 inmates of the institution were overcome by the flames and smoke almost

without warning. In all the long and dismal record of fatal fires in Roches found which can equal this one in its general horror, in the pathetic scenes in which so many lives were blotted out; in the gallant sacrifice of lives of the attendants in whose charge the children were, and in the sad scenes at the hospitals and morgue.

MANY WERE SAVED. That so many children were saved from the west wing of the building seems little short of miraculous, and when the ruins were visited, one mar-veled that the death roll was not even larger. The scene following almost immediately upon the discovery of the

fire and the accompanying explosion was one which turned the stoutest hearts sick. The windows of the west hearts sick. The windows of the west wing were filled with the terrified faces of thettiny waifs. Working like men possessed, the firemen struggled to release them from their perilous to release them from their perious position. The rooms of the dormitory were filled with the smoke of the fire, and the little ones were being slowly suffocated. Most of those rescued were lowered to the ground by means of ladders from the second and third

AWFUL SCENES

The ambulances from every hospital in the city reached the scene almost as soon as the fire department, but they proved totally inadequate in pro-viding for those rescued. Many suf-ferers and the dead were removed to the houses in the immediate neighbor-hood.

hood.

There were awful scenes around the asylum at the time. Most of those rescued from the building were unconscious from the effects of smoke. It soon became apparent that the building was doomed. A general alarm was sent in and the entire department of the city was soon on the scene. The fire was stubbornly fought from ever available point, but it was over an hour after its discovery before it was under control.

While all sorts of excuses were put forward for the disaster, there was unanimity in conceding that the managers had been derelict in that there had not been derelict in that there had not been a better and more complete system of fire escapes provided. One Thomas C. Montgomery frankly expressed the opinion that the managers had been negligent in that they did not employ a nightwatchman at the asylum and that they had not had the building patrolled nightly.
