Snow Blockade Responsible.

Lindsay, Oct. 12.—On Saturday, Charles Armstrong of Kirkfield, who three months ago was arrested on a charge of embezzlement, and has since been in jail here, was sentenced to a month more imprisonment by Judge Dean. Armstreng was, for a year and a half, buying grain at Kirkfield for L. Coffee, Toronto. #### SIR WILFRID FORGOT

R. L. Borden Corrects Slip Made By Premier At Hamilton.

Sir Wilfrid's Memory Proved Poor, As He Failed to Remember the Changes Made in the Grand Trunk Pacific Contract Between 1903 and 1904-Conservative Leader Gets Great Reception At

Brockville, Oct. 11.—(Special-)—The visit to Brockville to-day of R. L. Borden, the Conservative leader, proved another triumph in his Ontario tour now drawing to a close, Accompanied by Mrs. Borden he reached here this afternoon and was given a cordial reception.

by Mrs. Borden he reached here this afternoon and was given a cordial reception.

In the evening an enthusiastic rally was held in the Grand Opera House, which was packed to the doors with an audience numbering 2000. People came from all parts of the district, and as many more were turned away unable to gain admission.

Mr. Borden was escorted to the building by the 41st Regimental Band. His appearance on the platform was the signal for an outburst of applause, which was renewed again and again on his formal introductions by the chairman, H. A. Stewart. He was then presented with an address of welceme, proclaiming him the representative of all that is best in Canadian citizenship and public morality. His utterances in regard to the transcontinental rallway and the policy to be pursued by him were heartily endorsed, and his attitude on the pelicy enunciated by Rt. Hon. Joseph Chamberlain was commended. The address closed with a strong endorsation of Mr. Borden's support of the principle of adequate protection for Canadian industries.

Sir Wilfrid Corrected. Mr. Borden was in fine fettle, and discussed the political issues of the day at great length and in masterly style, dealing principally with the government's transcontinental railway.

He corrected a statement made by Sir Wilfrid Laurier in his Hamilton speech and showed that the premier did not himself understand the terms of the contract with the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway. He made this criticism deliberately taking for granted The Globe's report to be correct.

Sir Wilfrid says: "We have stipulated," referring to the \$25,000,000 of common stock, which is given to the G.T.R. in the contract, "that the G.T.R. not the G.T.P., but the old company, are to possess and retain it during the whole term of the lease."

And so they did in the contract of 1903, but they had absolutely changed it in the contract of 1904, which apparently Sir Wilfrid Laurier had forgotten.

Mr. Borden went into detail because he maintained it was important that the people of this country whould understand the position. There was a provision in the contract of 1903 that the G.T.P. should be at liberty te issue \$45,000,000 in common stock, altho so far as one can see the arrangement made by means of bonds and guarantee were enough to build the whole road, and parliament was told that \$25,000,000 of this common stock is going to be handed over to the G.T.R. corporation and probably for a merely nominal consideration.

The candidate, Mr. Culbert, made a pleasing address, and was warmly received. After Andrew Broder, ex-M.P., Morrisburg; Dr. Reid, ex-M.P., Prescott, and A. E. Donovan, Athens, had spoken briefly, the meeting closed with the usual cheers, Mr. Borden being escorted back to the hotel by demonstrative crowds.

Brampton, Oct. 12.—R. R. Gamey was cheered to the echo by a large meeting last night, as he unraveled the details of his case against the Ontario Government. W. A. In opening his remarks, he referred to Gamey's trip to Buffalo, coupling it with the statement that perhaps it was because of trouble at home, or because there was a woman in the case.

#### 500 TREES LEVELED.

Many Buildings Likewise Suffered in the District Around Lucan.

Lucan, Oct. 12.—The wind storm that passed in an easterly direction through this section at 6 o'clock on Monday evening was much more destructive than was at first reported.
Besides two dwellings and barns belonging to Henry C. Hodgins, which were completely destroyed, those of Thomas Abbott, on the Chappel line, together with six acres of bush, met a similar fate. Five hundred trees were leveled to the ground, some of them being car-ried 20 rods, William Toohey's sheds and Dennis Heenan's orchard were also destroyed. Miles of fence were also destroyed. Miles of fence were torn up and carried across lots. The path of the storm cut through the Cedarvale swamp on concession five, Biddulph, and on to Granton Village, five miles east, unroofing several buildings.
