Insect Marvels.

WHAT THE HOP APHIS UNCHECKED WOULD DO IN ONE YEAR.

Few persons, writes James Buckland in a report of the Smithsonian Institution, realize how enormous is the number of insect species or how amazing is their power of multiplication. The number of insect species is greater by far than that of the species of all other living creatures combined. More than 300,000 have been described, and probably twice that number remain to be examined. Virtually all living animals, as well as most plants, supply food for these innumerable hordes. The fecundity of certain insect forms is astounding. Riley once reported that the progeny of the hop aphid, which six thirteen generations born in a single year, would, if unchecked, be the end of the twelfth greatest number to the insectivorous number of ten trillions of individuals. Supplementing that calculation, Forbes says that if this brood were marshaled in line, ten to the inch, it would extend to a point as sunk in the head of the procession, traveling at the rate of 184,000 miles a second, would take 7,500 years to reach the earth.

The manufacture, sale and use of these 'Giant Evils' are the enemies of the best interests of mankind, and are in direct disobedience to the commandments, statutes, judgements, laws of God, and contrary to the plain teaching and precept of Jesus and his Apostles (1 Cor. 10: 31).
Destroyers not Saviours.—Do you know that poisonous drugs, alcohol and tobacco, are neither meat nor drink? that they have neither health-giver nor curative powers? that they are destroyers—not saviours? (Isaiah 55: 1-3). We are told not to defile the temple of God—which is our bodies (2 Cor. 7: 1-3; Rom. 12: 1-3). The military authorities prohibited cigarette smoking on the grounds that it was very prominent, being an obstacle to the soldier's efficiency. He also was a member of the Mass troop ship, because 'cigarette smoking is injurious to health', etc. It unites the soldier for best service to his king and country, and if he gets sick or wounded, makes his chance for recovery far less than the soldier who has no poison in his system. Considering these things, which is the most patriotic, to supply or withhold from our boys at the front, that which we know works physical injury, and may perhaps prevent an ultimate recovery because of a weakened system? Oh, yes, you are only a little thing. Quite innocent looking too. But lots of war and misery are caused by such as you.

New Hot Water Drink.

One does not need to be a prohibitionist to realize that alcohol does not make for either efficiency or comfort in hot weather. We are so wedded to the water that we are apt to drink far too much of this if it is taken plain. Flavoured in some way, less fluid seems more thirst-quenching. A very old-fashioned drink which can be made at home and costs but very little is called Switchel. To make this take a good-sized enamel water pitcher or pan and put in it half a cup of black molasses to two cups of water. Molasses, oddly enough, discolors most of the metallic kitchen ware, but it has no effect upon the hard, impervious surface of enameled ware. Add a teaspoonful of powdered ginger to a pint of the mixture. If not in an immediate hurry, it is better to make this with hot water and set away to cool. This is a particularly wholesome drink for young and delicate children.

Some Calculator.

An amusing story is going the rounds relative to the result of a clerk in a local real estate office asking for an increase in wages. The boss listened to the many reasons why an increase should be granted, and when the clerk had finished he was told to sit down and we will figure this thing out. First, we will put down the number of days in a year—365. You sleep eight hours a day, one-third of the time. We will deduct that 122 days from 365, leaving 243 days. 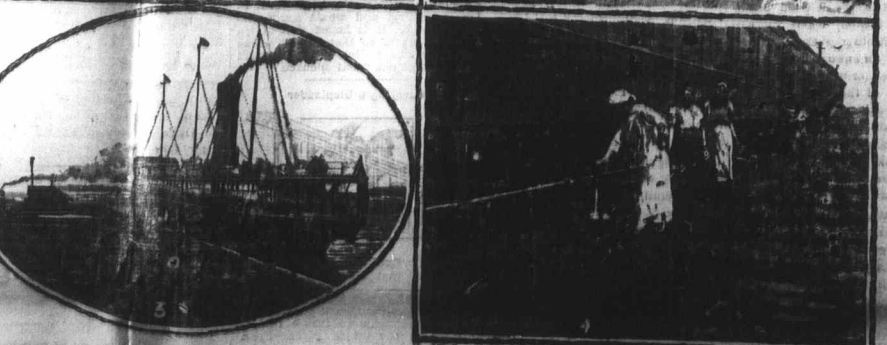

BEFORE the war there were five million, five hundred women wage earners in Great Britain; today there are 24 to be over ten million. Five million men have enlisted for active service, and a woman has taken the place of every able-bodied man who might have been engaged in peacetime occupations. England has never been so busy a manufacturing and industrial country as she is in 1916; but this would never have been possible if women had not stepped into the breach.

In Canada there is not the same supply of surplus available women, so that in this respect Canada has not experienced so great a revolution in industrial life, but many new occupations are being opened to Canadian women, and the demand for women workers in factories and in the great industrial life of the railways is steadily on the increase. If Sir Robert Borden is to secure his 500,000 Canadian soldiers, 100,000 women must temporarily step into the shoes of men some places as Station Agents with for services, as the limit of available men seems almost to be reached. Women are already working alongside of men in sacking and handling grain at the Great Lakes elevators, in the Canadian Pacific yards, in the telegraph services and cleaners and track grassers.

In many clerical positions hitherto held by men, they are acting in satisfaction to their employers. But Canadians who visit England are surprised to find women ticket inspectors and guards, women elevator attendants, women chauffeurs, and train conductors, women as red caps, porters and ticket clerks; women as locomotive drivers, women as cleaners and track grassers.
