CANADA'S VETERAN LUMBER KING SUPERVISES SHIPMENT OF BIG TIMBERS Four trainloads of virgin white pine from Ontario forests were shipped by John R. Booth, lumber king of Ottawa, to England for the British Admiralty. This was the largest shipment of lumber to be exported from Canada since before the war and consisted of the finest timbers that have come out of Ontario's forests in the history of the oldest lumbermen. 
