New Brunswick produce merchants who have business interests in Cuba, as most of them have, report that the people of that country express a desire for reciprocity in trade with Can-

Since the United States has closed its doors to Canada, Cuba is the chief outlet for Canadian agricultural products, lumber and manufactures and the only market for Maritime potatoes and all that are shipped there are dutiable at a high rate. Reciprocal trade relations would be a fine thing for Canadian exporters, particularly for the lumbermen and agriculturists of the Maritime provinces.

Since the natural products of Cuba are articles which cannot be produced in Canada, and the goods that country desires to import are specialties of Canadian production, free trade reletions would be quite logical. It would certainly be a stimulus to business in eastern Canada and the matter should be taken up and thoroughly gone into by the government.


