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LOCAL MATTERS.

CAPE TORMENTINE WHARF.—Mr. Murphy, Contractor, expects to have half of the stone embankment, or 650 feet, completed by the 1st of June.

A BAND STAND is to be erected on Mr. Wood's property between Dr. Coleman's office and Music Hall Block, and will be ready for the occupation of the Band next Saturday evening.

THE FIRST SALMON.—The first salmon of the season was caught near Black Brook, tangled in a gaspene net. The owner got the value of a half barrel of flour for him.—Chatham World.

VESSEL SOLD.—Brigantine Willie has been sold in London for about \$5,000. The Willie was 366 tons register, was built at this place in 1874 and was owned by Capt. Wm. Milner and others.

SPRINGS LIGHTNING.—Lightning struck John Goldfarb's barn at Nixon, Albert Co., on Friday evening and burned it to the ground. Nice head of cattle were burned and other property in the barn.

ENTERPRISE FOUNDER.—The St. John News says: "It is said that the Enterprise Foundry Co., Sackville, are considering the advisability of removing their plant to St. John." There is, however, very little probability of the removal taking place at any time, and it is safe to say that it will not occur this year.

LABOR LAWRENCE.—Eighty Italian laborers arrived here on Monday. Fifty have been employed by Messrs. Dawson, Symmes & Usher, and the others are working on Mr. Moore's property. More laborers are expected on Saturday. The work is making good progress. Messrs. J. A. McQueen & Co.'s store, near the dock, is filled to overflowing, and the laborers say the prices are right.

THE WIAWAS.—Matters have been quite lively at the wharves during the past week. Schr. Crown Prince sailed for St. John, Saturday, with deals for St. John; schr. June sailed for West Bay yesterday with deals, and schr. Hazelwood is nearly loaded for sea place. Schr. Jona arrived from Boston on Tuesday last with general cargo for parties in Sackville, Amherst and Oxford, and is now discharged.

N. Y. FREESTONE QUARRYING Co. will next week commence stripping an area on the property owned by them at Wood Point. They have already got out 400 tons of good stone this spring from the old quarry. The report that the quarry is to be closed is unfounded. It probably had its origin in the fact that a quantity of inferior stone has been found in old workings, but there is no probability that the work will be abandoned while the company have forty acres of rock unstripped. Dr. Parson, president of the Company, is here at present.

Mr. ALLISON.—The new conservatory of music seems an assured success. The plans are ready, the architect being Mr. G. Ernest Fairweather. The building will be 85 feet long by 37 wide, and three stories high. It will present a handsome appearance and be an ornament to Mt. Allison grounds. The cost will be \$12,000, of which \$3,000 has been subscribed already. The date of commencement has not yet been fixed.—The Institutions close week after next.—A new departure will be taken in the examinations. The musical recital will take place at the Music Hall; where also the ladies' athletic class will give an exhibition of the literary drill to which they have been subjected under the skillful direction of Miss King.—The studio of the Ladies' College will likely this year be more attractive than ever.—An unusually large number of visitors is expected. Amongst others, Rev. W. H. E. Temple, of Trinity Congregational Church, Boston, Judge Burbridge, Dr. Weldon, Principal Calkin and others are expected.—Principal Borden will during the summer visit the Leavenworth Congregational Church in the United States, to pick up the latest improvements in musical appliances.—Prof. Robert Mabry, the violinist, will be present at the close of the year.—There are four graduates from the Ladies' College to the University. The University sends this year 17 graduates, the largest number ever graduated in one year.—Principal Davis is to be congratulated on the fact that the Male Academy has had a very successful year, with a larger attendance than for many years.—The Alumni oration will be delivered by Principal Anderson, of Prince of Wales College, by the essay by Miss S. E. Smith of St. John.—The anniversary sermon will be preached by Rev. Mr. Temple.

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
