GENERAL NEWS.

Mr. John Joseph Daley, Dominion Immigration agent at Montreal, is dead after having held the office 23 years.

The greater part of the village of Joppen, in the Gironda, has been destroyed by fire. Fourteen persons lost their lives in the conflagration.

Captain Illino, whose death has just been reported from Russia, commanded "the terrible battery" which made such havoc at Sebastopol. Tolstai has immortalized this battery in his work in the operations in that siege.

The street car stables of the West End (Poston) street railway at Medford, N. B., were burned last night. The loss is \$125,000. Two bodies were taken from the ruins, one so badly disfigured it could not be identified. The other is supposed to be a motor man. Four other employees are missing, and they may be in the ruins.

France at present appears to be on the verge of a revolution. The people who were victimized by the Panama Canal swindle have discovered that about a million of their dollars went to the pockets of the government, and the press in silence, and within the past two or three days it has been looking as if serious trouble were ahead of the Republic.

A youth of eighteen summers who lives in Saco, Maine, and who works on a farm at salary of \$13 a month, has just been married to a woman old enough to be his mother—perhaps his grandmother—who has been married several times before and has several divorced husbands living. The young man evidently had no intention of launching his bark upon the troubled sea of matrimony without an experienced crew.

Two million dollars is quite a sum to put into a private dwelling house, and yet that is what Cornelius Vanderbilt's house on Fifth avenue, New York is to cost, according to reports. It is to be 130 feet long by 78 deep, and is to stand on the corner of Fifth avenue and Fifty-seventh street. There are to be fine gardens attached, so that the house grounds will cover almost an entire city block.
