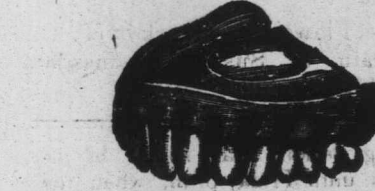

A Toronto despatch says that Canada will shortly be divided into seven military districts, the boundaries of which shall be co-extensive with the several provinces. A local officer with the rank of Major-General will be in command of each district.

No 24 freight which left Moncton on Monday morning for Truro, was badly wrecked about a mile and a half west of River Phillip. The engine and ten cars left the rails and the road bed was torn up for some 400 feet. The passengers and baggage on the maritime express were transferred, the north bound train being four hours late in reaching Campbellton.

Some changes are made in the timetable of the I. C. R. as a result of the new train, the Ocean Limited. The local express now leaves here for East at 7.10, thirty minutes earlier, and for St. Flavie at 5.15, and arrives from St. Flavie at 17.45, fifteen minutes earlier, and from St. Flavie at 20.15. The Ocean Limited arrives from east at 19.35 and from the west at 8.35.

Attached to the Campbellton express this morning was a handsome new first class car just turned out of Rhode Curry & Co's at Amherst. ### OBITUARY.

The following is a translation of LaPatrie's account of the obsequies of the late Dr. Venner—

At a late date the town of Campbellton has lost by the death of Dr. John Venner, one of its most honorable and highly estimated citizens.

He was the first Canadian physician to settle in the newly born town. The departed was born in the City of Quebec, went through his classical course at Ste. Anne de LaPatrie College and then followed the Medical Course of Laval University and Bishop College where he graduated as M. D. with great honors. In 1875 he left Quebec for a new field, Campbellton, which proved to be his lasting home. Two years after he married in his native town, Miss Corinne d'Estimenville, daughter of the late Chevalier d'Estimenville de Beaumouche, Lawyer of St. Thomas of Montmagny.

The Dr. possessing the confidence of the citizens, was instructed with highest municipal changes, was Coroner, Alderman, etc. He was devoted to his practice, and a great friend to the poor. In a few years he managed to control a very enviable financial position. He was one of the first to promote the establishment of the Hotel Dieu Hospital in Campbellton. The first missionary of that highly estimated Order came from Montreal and Chatham.

The expressions of sympathy to the bereaved family came and still coming from all parts of Canada and many from the United States. A profusion of flower offerings, comprising, Crowns, Crosses, Stars, were deposited on the casket by the English and French Society, as a last token of their friendship for the departed, also many spiritual offerings, Mementoes and Masses.

The funeral service took place Friday last at 9 a. m. and was very imposing. The Rev. Father Wallace, Pastor, a great friend of the departed, officiated, the Rev. Father Drapau, a cousin of the d'Estimenville family, acted as Deacon, and the Rev. Father Robichaud as Sub-Deacon.

The ball-bearers were Dr. Lunan Messrs. Ferguson Fraser, Henry McIntyre, Wm Clapperton, M. P. P. John McGovern, of the I. C. R. and A. McG. McDonald.

The casket was followed by young boys bearing flower offerings.

The Rev. Father Wallace made the Panegyric of Dr. Venner, layed much stress on his personal merit, devotion to the poor and unfortunate, and emphasized his loyalty and frankness of character and his readiness to share in all good deeds and help to the progress of the town and surrounding.

After a last requiescat in pace the mortal remains were deposited in the family lot.

To the bereaved family, composed of his wife and four daughters, Mrs. John Harquail, the Misses Corinette, Janet and Georgine, Mrs. Dr. E. Valois, Montreal, his sister, and brother Dr. F. W. Venner, Wisconsin, we tender our sincere sympathy in their bereavement.

It is with deepest regret that we record the death of Mr. Donald McCormick which took place at his home in Belledune on Wednesday the 29th inst.

The deceased was a native of Scotland and came to Black Lands Restigouche in 1832, and the last 27 years he resided in Belledune.

About the first of April he was taken ill with cancer of the stomach. His sufferings which were very great were borne with Christian fortitude waiting the hour which set him free and brought him home to God.

He was a member of the Presbyterian Church in full communion. The funeral took place on Friday and was largely attended, the re-

mains being interred in the New Mills Cemetery. The services at the house were conducted by Rev. J. M. McLeod and assisted at the grave by Rev. T. Nicholson. The Rev. Father Van de Mortel of Belledune and Purcell of Jacques River were also present, and spoke comforting words to the bereaved family.

The deceased was 72 years of age and leaves a sorrowing wife, five sons and five daughters to mourn the loss of a kind and loving husband and father. The sorrowing family has the sympathy of the entire community.

## LOCAL PATRIOTISM.

A STUDY OF CANADA'S LITTLE LON. BY EDGAR WALLACE.

Except Dawson City the Dominion has no so-called boom towns—many of them there have sprung into importance in a few years—faith in the future justified.

I turned at the door to light, my pipe and congratulate the lady behind the counter on the obviously growing prosperity of the town.

"Take your pipe out, mister," she commanded. "I don't allow no smoking in this store." Then, mollified by my evident confusion, she resumed: "Well, we reckon this is a fine city."

"Heavily," I murmured, gratefully, "you mean town." "City I said," said the lady sharply, and don't put your muddy boots on these floors. At any rate, we shall soon be incorporated. This here Moore & Lay's colonial development would trace indications of unusual prosperity. To the uninitiated it was a beginning promisingly enough, with red-brick hotel and trailing off into prairie land.

There are no boom towns in Canada—if you except Dawson City—as we understand boom towns. There are towns which have sprung into importance in a few years, such as Edmonton and Calgary and Regina. But these have had a long history of standing, and have only increased in ratio to the prosperity of the surrounding country. When Winnipeg was the Hudson Bay Company's post Fort Garry, it occupied relatively the same position to Manitoba as it does now. Immigration increased, it was a pitifully slow process—more and more prairie-land was broken in; the wheat crop became bigger and bigger—the needs of the urban population correspondingly increased both in quantity and variety; agriculture became a scientific pursuit, necessitating improved machinery; the old settler, who for years had roughed out the bare essentials of life for the little luxuries of civilization easier to procure; and so Winnipeg became at once the marketing station for products and the distributing point for necessities, whether it was fine cloth or patent plows.

As it was, Winnipeg, so Moore Jaw, or the thousand little townships spread over Canada, tapping the country, feeding the mines, banking money, and drawing in incorporation. For a town reaches the dignity of a city till it has a population of 10,000. Any number of people from 10,000 to 20,000, gathered together in one place, constitute a township. From 20,000 to 100,000 they form the population of a city. Over 100,000 they are The Earth.

This is the way of Canada; it is also the way of the States, except that there any old street of frame-houses has its city hall and corporation. In Canada, incorporation is a prize to which every proper town aspires. It is a goal to which the newest village that was ever tacked on to a C.P.R. elevator strives.

Consequently, men from the back places are inveterate liars, though this may be said in their favor, that they believe all they tell. Bragi there is no brag quite like it.

"If you can find time it will pay you to stop off at Wrinkles. A fine town, yes sir. I don't suppose there's another town like Wrinkles in all Canada. We've got as magnificent a church as you've ever seen outside of Montreal; banks, court-house, post-office, hotel; and we're just installing electric light and a car service.

Alas! That the bank, postoffice and court-house are beneath one humble roof that the hotel is kept by He Chow; that the church is a microscopic baw with a wooden steeple; that the electric light and car service are unblushing myths.

Or it is, "You ought not to miss Bear's Head Creek. I don't want to brag about it, but you'll be surprised. Don't leave Canada without seeing it. We've got a newspaper there, too, that will interest you."

You go. It is indeed, a thriving township, and the newspaper is a fact. The day you arrive, there have been big happenings in Bear's Head Creek. Behold the front page of the paper. Across four columns in black type—"Local firm gets a thousand-dollar contract. Contractor O'Grady in open competition secured order for erecting new hotel. Successful competitor speaks with Gasette man, and expresses confidence in the future of Bear's Head Creek."

Let it be thought that I am attempting to poke a poor form of fun at these little Londona struggling for recognition, let me say right here that I know no finer, no more inspiring sight than is afforded by the spectacle of the almost heroic efforts of the average Canadian township of smaller size to justify its glorious faith in the future.

"Here," says the man of the new town, "is a spot which by Providence, by natural position, by extraordinary conditions, and the proximity to the Canadian Pacific Railway is destined to be the Chicago of the West. Let us, the early fathers

of the city, prepare the ground for future generations."

So the man of the new town sits on the snake-fence, puffing at his pipe, dreaming dreams, peeping the mellow cornfields with phantom millions; gazing on this patch a skyscraper, as that a mammoth store, and speculating with some regret, but with a stern sense of duty, the little church, and the postoffice shack to make place for a ten-story hotel. And of their faith shall they in a degree be justified. Not all of them shall be citizens of a new Chicago—a poor enough ideal, God wots!—but they shall greatly grow. They shall hit higher than they aim, because that is how the ideal works out; but in the meantime their never-ceasing fight to thrust into fame and place the town of their adoption constitutes as fine a display of true patriotism as one may well wish to see.—Edgar Wallace, in London Daily Mail.
