Joseph McGuire Acquitted by the Brantford Jury.

Snow By-law No Good-Cut Off His Finger.

102 King street east. RAILROADS. (Special Despatch to the Times.) Brantford, March 18.—Joseph McGuire, Grand Trunk yardman, practically received his liberty at the Spring Assizes here last night on two indictments, criminal negligence and manslaughter, when the jury after three hours' deliberation failed to find a verdict. The jury stood seven to five for acquittal, and it is not likely the Crown will again press for conviction. The trial took up the whole day, many Grand Trunk officials and employees being called, who blamed the prisoner for violation of a specific rule covering the sending out of local yard engines to assist freight trains up the local grades. According to the rule yard foremen must protect safe return of en-gine from outgoing trains. This Mc-Guire, who testified in his own behalf, practically admitted failing to do, assert-ing that pressure of work, owing to the company cutting down the staff and withdrawing one engine, had been re-sponsible for diverting his attention and allowing another train to slip out un-noticed. Judge MacMahon charged strongly against the prisoner, who had made a statement to the Grand Trunk officials in which he assumed all re-sponsibility. This statement made at the investigation into the eause of the wreek by the officials was put in as evi-dence at the trial. When McGuire first heard of the disaster his exclamation to Engineer Prime, "It's up to me," was practically admitting the culpability. Three were killed in the wreek and two injured last October.
