sign of Responsible Government in England, the speech from the Throne ought to be the strength of the Ministry and subject to criticism as such. The Queen does not write her speech, and when it is discussed in the House, both of Lords and Commons, every possible liberty is given to it. And though it is the case down there in the pay of Government, may talk of Responsible Government, but that is all, it has no existence, it is *not of preference*, and as under the old system, every thing depends upon whether the Governor be an honest and able man, and anxious to do all in his power for the benefit of the Country. "If he is, why, things will go well, and if not, a great deal of confusion will arise, and we shall have to petition to have him removed, as we did in the case of Capt. Douglas Smith, and Sir Henry Handley, and as we should have had to do with Sir Alexander Bannerman if he had not seen in good time—it would have been better a month or two earlier—removed." We must not, however, "cast any odium upon those who fear for personally offending the Lieutenant Governor." In this thrown out as a threat, or as an intimidation, to prevent us from speaking our mind freely upon a subject of so much importance! If it was intended as such, it might have been better spent. While through the Lieut. Governor were personally offended? Does the Editor of the *Examiner* think that any arisen fear of the Lieutenant Governor's displeasure would prevent us from fearlessly doing our duty, if we honestly and conscientiously thought that he was acting in any way derogatory to the rights and liberties of the subject? No! we would boldly tell him so, and stand him against a repetition. If he were an honest man, he would think the more highly of us, and if he were not, we should the less care, whether he were personally offended or not. But we are not in the least alarmed about the matter. We shall be well pleased to find, that the present Lieut. Governor keeps a large share of the power in his own hands. He is far better to be at the head of the Government than any of his Ministers, as they are pleased to term themselves. All that he can learn from them, so long as he does not run after them to blind him, or keep him in the dark, there is no doubt that whatever emanates from himself will be for the good of the Island. We can well believe that the composition of the speech is from the pen of the Lieut. Governor, and for this plain reason, that there is not one of his Administration capable of drawing up an official document as it ought to be. But enough, the Lieut. Governor will give us credit for no wish to make him answerable for the acts of his predecessor, or those done by bodies over which he has had no control, and which happened before he assumed the Government, it is of the speech treats, and we have too much confidence in his political skill and knowledge of official routine, to suppose that he will, for a moment, be offended with a public writer for commenting upon a public document.
