how swift the current, or how steep the falls. Of course this statement must be construed liberally and not literally. A cataract like Niagara, or a perpendicular fall like that of the Montmorency River, of 285 feet, would be too much of an obstacle for an ordinary salmon. But the Falls of Lorette, near Quebec, which are made up of a succession of short tumbles, over which the water rushes at almost lightning speed, offer no impediment to the salmon. He apparently labours no harder in making the ascent than the descent. But the salmon has his nest in quiet water, in pools through which the current moves slowly. It is to these pools that the fishermen go to cast their lines, batted with artificial flies. Thefishing apparatus consists of a light cane pole and a reel of fine silk line, measuring about 400 feet. With this light apparatus salmon are taken weighing thirty to thirty-five pounds, not by force, however, but by strategy. The cast is made from the bank of the proof, and there the fisherman prefers to use the fly as it touches the surface of the pool, and darts out of his hiding-place like a flash. But he slackens his speed as he approaches the fly, perhaps to get time to say grace before he dines. He does not snap at the fly, as the trout does. His fashion is to open his mouth, take in the fly, and then drop, hooking himself. The rodsman is spared the trouble of jerking his line. It takes an instant only for the fish to become conscious that he has a hook in his come conscious that no mas a mook in his upper lip. It is a maddening pain, and the salmon, being a decidedly hot-tempered fish, gives way to passion, and tears about in a terrible fashion. The fisherman must be prepared for

ALL KINDS OF ANTICS. The fish is apt at first to "turn tail and run," and while he runs a hundred feet or so, the reel that holds the line will spid about with the greatest rapidity. At the end of his run, the fish is exasperated to find that the hook still hangs to his gills. Quicker than thought, and perhaps without knowing what he is doing, he turns on his track and runs directly for the shore. He may be bent on getting to his nest. As excited. He may be bent on getting to his nest. As he approaches, the fisherman makes haste to wind up the line, and if he has the most improved real he will accomplish the winding so quickly that the slack will be all taken up by the time the fish comes to a halt. The fisherman then gives his line an exasperating little pull, and in an instant the fish jumps six or eight, or even ten feet out of the water. A second later he will be darting through the water in a most eccentric manner. Then comes the second jump, which is even more astonish ing than the first. At the conclusion of these athletic exercises the salmon may be-think himself of the sea. If he does, the attendants will have work to do. They will hastily paddle the canoe from the place in which they have been lurking, and take the rodsman on board. Then they will hasten after the flying fish, which has perhaps a hundred yards the start of them. The flight and pursuit will continue as long as the strength of the fish holds out, and will cover one, two, or three miles, and, in exceptional cases, a longer distance. There is no more exciting sport than following a salmon down the rapids in his run toward the sea. At length the poor fish comes to a halt, but he will in all probability make a death-struggle—an exaggerated repetition of the antics that followed his catching on the hook. At length it is all over with him, and it only remains for one of the assistants to hook him with the gaff and

Sometimes the fisherman falls in with what is called a "sulk," and in that event made he may look for a trial of patience between himself and the fish. The "sulk" is apt to be a large fish, and his mode of fighting to be a large fish, and his mode of fighting for liberty is well described in his name. He no sooner realizes that he is hooked than he droops to the bottom of the stream and calmly waits, his hope, no doubt, being that he may tire out the fellow at the other end of the line. It is a vain hope in most cases. The rule obtains among salmon fishers that no man having put his hand upon a salmon can withdraw without dishonour. The "wait" has been known to continue the greater has been known to continue the greater part of a day. A gentleman of unquestionable veracity told me that on one occasion he knew a salmon to be on the hook. from five o'clock in the morning until noon, and in the end escape. It is not the number of fishes that a man takes in the day that measures his sport. It is the "gameness," as he calls it, of the fish that deness," as he calls it, of the fish that delights him. But it not infrequently happens that a single fisher brings in ten or twelve good-sized specimens in a day's fishing, their combined weight aggregating from 200 to 300 pounds. The care of the fish, after they have been landed, devolves upon the attendants. Those which are to be kept for any length of time are packed in snow, which is kept all the year round in houses built for the purpose. If one is to be sent away, he is put in a rough wooden box, and packed closely with snow. Packed in this manner, salmon may easily be sent from the mouth of the Saguenay to New York, and arrive in perfect order.


