OUR TURN NOW

It would seem that the tide which has been setting so steadily towards the great vacant West is going, at last, to also benefit the East of Canada. As the West fills up with agriculturalists there is an increasing demand for manufacturing the coal and water power for which is found in such abundance in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia. As Ohio, Pennsylvania, New Jersey, New York and New England—the northeast corner—does nearly all the manufacturing for Eastern and Central United States, so in time must New Brunswick and Nova Scotia do the bulk of eastern and middle Canada's manufacturing.

FREE SPEECH

Serious trouble is reported from Vancouver, arising, in the first place, from great lack of employment and, in the second, from the civic authorities forbidding the unemployed and their sympathizers, the Industrial Workers of the World and other Labor Unions and the Socialist Party of Canada, to air their grievances in open air meetings upon vacant lots and open spaces where the Salvation Army and others and, for years, the Labor men and Socialists themselves have been allowed to congregate and hold meetings of protest or any other meetings they liked. Very recently the attitude of the authorities has changed and the meeting of the unemployed in an open space a few days ago was forcibly broken up by the police, some of the speakers and spectators being badly cut up. In consequence, the victims and their friends have held indoor meetings since at some of which the British flag has been roughly handled.

The tearing down of the Union Jack which in Great Britain and Ireland protects all political parties—Liberal, Conservative, Socialist and nationalist—in holding meetings either in halls or in the open air, was ill advised. The flag should not be blamed for the actions of the Mayor and Council of Vancouver. Two wrongs do not make a right.

It would seem that something is radically wrong in British Columbia. First, the Public should see that all men have a chance to work at just remuneration, and secondly, it should see that all its citizens are secured the same rights as people are guaranteed in the Walls.

Mother Country where, recently, 5000 troops were sent to a certain city to ensure that an unpopular party would not be molested in their political meeting. Britain's way is the best way. Unnecessary friction between the authorities and the unemployed should be avoided.

Provincial Self-Government For Ireland

First Step Towards the Federation of the British Empire, Says Churchill at Belfast.

Hon. Winston Churchill, first lord of the admiralty, addressed a meeting of 6,000 people in Belfast on the 8th inst. There was no riot and no one was hurt. 5,000 imperial troops were prepared for emergencies but there was no occasion for their use. Mr. Churchill outlined the proposed Home Rule Bill, the main features of which are the following:— Irish home rule to fit into a general scheme of Parliamentary devolution, leading ultimately to the federation of the Empire. Provision to be made for fair representation of minorities in the House and Senate. Supremacy of the Imperial Parliament to be maintained in respect of all legislation. Military to remain under Imperial control.

The Irish Parliament to have real control of its finances, subject to the financial system of the United Kingdom. Ireland to obtain a subsidy of \$10,000,000 a year, which may ultimately be increased. Land purchase and old-age pensions to be carried out by the Imperial Parliament.

Irish representation at Westminster to be reduced. Religious freedom to be secured. A special despatch to the Montreal Star, of the 10th inst., says that "The Irish Nationalists are delighted with the issue of the Belfast crisis. Irishmen realize this morning that there exists a new Belfast, in which good humor takes the place of the old bitterness, and tolerance the place of bigotry. Sir Edward Carson admits that a good reception. The generous money settlement, indicated as part of the Home Rule Bill, a settlement which Mr. Churchill says, is as cheap as the price of converting a loyal Ireland into something more than the equivalent of large military and naval forces; makes it impossible to maintain this anti-Home Rule agitation with anything like its recent heat."
