To Protect Little Folks  
Trustee Burleigh suggested that the Kindergarten and junior classes be dismissed on Friday night instead of a week from Friday owing to the excessive heat. In some classes the temperature ran up to 90 degrees. One little girl was overcome with the heat and as a result had a convulsion.

Chairman Byrne felt that the teachers should use their own judgment and if the rooms became too hot the classes could be dismissed.

Inspector Hetherington thought that if the heat continued the classes should be dismissed at noon.

The Secretary said Dr. Currey, Medical Health Officer, had submitted a report recommending action, owing to the heat. The matter was left in the hands of Inspector Hetherington to act.

Lancaster Property  
Considerable discussion took place about the Lancaster property on York Street. The offer of the Board of \$8,000 was accepted by Mrs. Lancaster but the Board was not clear on what the costs of arbitration which had been started will be or how the costs are to be settled. Mr. Lancaster for his mother agreed to pay his own costs and the arbitrator but the Board must pay their own costs. The Board was not satisfied with the agreement as it did not state what the costs will amount to and from Mr. Kingstone's letter they have no idea what they will be. The Board wanted a full statement of accounts.

It was moved by Trustee Paxton seconded by Trustee Jones that the Secretary Treasurer be authorized to issue a check for \$8000 to cover the costs of purchase of the Lancaster property. The resolution carried.

The costs of the settlement are to be considered later.

The Board then adjourned.

would get the road anyway without making a contribution.

Certain of the Estimates

In reply Mr. Gaby went carefully into the costs of labor, rolling stock, rails, electrical equipment, ties, poles etc. He stated the prices at which the Commission could buy today in large quantities and answered each detail of price as given by Ald. Riffer and the Mayor as to individual costs. He also made the significant statement that even though there were increases in the cost of some things the Commission in estimating in 1916 had made an allowance of from 16 to 25 per cent. to absorb this. Hence in now checking everything over with the quotations they had from all over they felt satisfied of their grounds.

He further backed up the judgment of the Commission by a statement made by Mr. D. B. Hanna that he could build a road for the C. N. R. or the National railways for seven millions over the same country.

The municipalities were therefore taking no chances on any liability over the estimate of 1916.

As to Saltfleet and Flamboro Mr. Gaby said that the Commission had assurances from responsible men in those places that they did not want the other places to bear their share of the cost and that when another by-law is submitted it will be carried.

## Information Too Indefinite

Ald. Dekkers and Riffer then spoke and said they were not yet satisfied with the information given. The Council had not been told how the radial road proposed to go through this city and to the frontier nor how much it would cost. Ald. Riffer quoted figures on materials who, as a manufacturer who got daily quotations. He felt that Mr. Gaby's figures were too low and that the road would likely cost more than estimated.

Ald. Westwood and Ald. Rose both argued that the people by their vote in 1916 strongly endorsed the hydro scheme and that this city was not taking any great chance in going after something its people had wanted for many years, namely a road from this west.

Ald. Nash was in favor of another road from the west, but he felt it would be wise to let the people vote on the extra liability.

Ald. Hill said the people wanted hydro radials and he for one was prepared to vote to give them what they wanted.

Ald. McDowell also stated that he thought the people wanted the road and he would vote for the resolution.

Ald. Riffer and Dekkers did not like the wrong interpretation placed on their remarks by The Standard. They were not opposed to hydro but they wanted all the facts.

## Felt a Vote Would Be Safe

After further discussion the committee rose and in regular Council the Mayor reviewed all phases of the matter as impartially as possible but said that he too thought it would be well to let the people vote when all

extra liability of \$60,000 was to be placed against the city.

A vote was then taken with the result that five aldermen stood for the resolution and three against it.
