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Husband Rescues Bride Kidnapped Two Weeks and Then Kills Man

CHICAGO, Feb. 19.—The strange story of how a pretty bride of a few months was kidnapped by a band

of thieves, held prisoner until her husband rescued her, and how later the husband was forced to kill one of the gang while protecting a small boy, will form an interesting chapter in the records of Judge Kersten's criminal court hearings when the case comes to trial April 1st.

Oscar Engstrom is charged with murder. The case was called for today, but was postponed to the April term. Engstrom and his young bride were living on a two-acre tract near Posen, Ill. The husband was making a good living, selling automobiles, and the wife worked the little truck farm.

Their nearest neighbors, with one exception, were several miles distant. There were two sons at the nearest neighbors' and men of rough character began to visit this place. One

day, when the husband was absent, these men abducted his bride. Several days later he found her at the other house and after a hard fight rescued her and took her home.

A few evenings later a six-year-old boy came to Engstrom's house, and begged to be taken in, as the men had threatened to kill him for telling Engstrom where they had hidden his wife. Two members of the gang came after the boy and, in the ensuing fight, Engstrom killed the leader.

Police say all the gang are murderers and fugitives from justice, and that the house was a resort and hiding place for the notorious Gloriana gang of professional murderers, a number of whom are now in custody and awaiting trial.

Coal in Canada May Take a Boost Because of High Exchange

A rumor is going the rounds in coal business circles that the United States railways may take a step which will increase the price of coal in Ontario by about 18 cents a ton.

At present the full freight bill from the Pennsylvania mines into the railway yards at Toronto is paid by the big Toronto dealers in Canadian currency. It is reported that after March 1st the American railways may insist that the freight bill from the Pennsylvania mines to the Canadian border be paid in American currency.

Now it costs today \$2.34 per short ton of 2,000 pounds to move coal from Pennsylvania to Toronto. And \$1.34 of that is the freight from the mines to the Canadian frontier. Clap on the difference of exchange between Canada and the U.S. money, which is today about 15 per cent, and you have added about 18 cents, which might conceivably be stretched into 25 cents.

Out of the more than eighty million tons of American coal which Canada consumes annually Toronto's consumption for the present coal year, which ends 1st April, 1920, will, as calculated approximately by the Fuel Commissioners, amount to about 2,250,000 tons of soft coal and 1,000,000 tons of anthracite, a total of 3,250,000 tons for the year. Such action by the American railways would, if taken, mean an additional coal bill for Toronto of over \$200,000 a year.
