

But, continued the speaker, there are matters in connection with our fisher ies that deserve the strictest attention of any Government in the interests of the fishermen. An item of vital importance is the bait supply. Lack of bait is a serious drawback to our codfishery operations. This fact cannot be refuted. One of the promises contained in the Manifesto of Sn Edward Morris was to overcome that difficulty but no attempt was ver made to carry out that promise 3ir Robert Bond, our capable statesnan, with his thirty years ripe experience of political lie and with characteristic foresight, will adopt measures o overcome that difficulty in the inerests of the fishermen, and the main issues outlined in Sir Robert's Manifesto are to reorganize the Marine and Fisheres Department and to establish Bait Depots. Continuing, Mr. Kent referred to the way our public monies are beng so lavishly wasted by the Picnic Party, who, if they get back to power will drive this colony to ir retrievable bankruptcy and ruin. Within the past four years during the term of office of the Morris Governnent the public debt on the Colony has increased seven and a half mil-

lions of dollars. If that party is reurned to power before the expiration of four years the public debt will be nore than double that amount. In 1910 Sir Edward Morris pledged his word on the floors of the House of Assembly that he would build five railways at a cost of \$4,000,000 whereas \$6,000,000 have already been spent and neither one of the railways is finished. Is not this striking evidence of the concessions granted to capitalists by the present Govern-
