Big Meeting

LIBERAL CANDIDATES ENTHUSIASTICALLY RECEIVED — MR. KENT GIVES THE TORIES A KNOCK-OUT BLOW.

The East End Liberal candidates, Messrs. Kent, Dwyer and Ryan, held a meeting at Outer Cove last night and, judging by the splendid ovation accorded them, it is a safe admission that the Grabbal party have received a death blow. The standard bearers of that historic settlement are more pronounced than ever in favor of Liberalism, and on October 30th will prove their allegiance to the principles of the grand old loyal party by voting the straight ticket for Kent, Dwyer and Ryan.

When the men approached the settlement in carriages they were greeted with constant cheering and firing of guns, and the reception was indeed a whole-souled one. The meeting was opened at eight o'clock in the school-room at Outer Cove by Chairman Doran. The hall was filled to its capacity, every available space being occupied.
