## The Campaign.

In no way do we hold with the use of violence at election or other times, and we regret that Mr. Blandford was maltreated at Bonavista. Mr. Blandford has a legal right to be in the booth and see how illiterates voted, but other candidates have foregone that right, as it is an unpleasant position for a voter to record his vote against a candidate in his presence, and in order to avoid this unpleasantness, some candidates do not go into any booth at all on polling day, and so avoid exercising any form of personal influence over a voter. According to the Herald, Mr. Blandford says "the most appalling doctrines as to the treatment of opponents are being preached by the Coakerite chiefs in this and other northern districts." This we deny point-blank, and particularly in its reference to Opposition candidates. In Bonavista Bay and Trinity Bay the latter rarely mentioned or referred to the candidates opposed to them, and never in words of personal disparagement. At many meetings they were not even mentioned or referred to in any way. In Trinity Bay, at one or two meetings, the people were asked to give the most favourable consideration to the personal standing, character and reputation of the Government candidates, against which not one word was said, and then to consider the Government they represented, and after doing so, to weigh carefully whether they would support the Government by voting for them. That was the style of campaign in both Bonavista and Trinity Bays, and it is a mere hallucination for any one to state that any infamous doctrines were preached by candidates.

The man who used such a word as infamous in this connection has undoubtedly a hazy conception of the meaning of the word. As to what was done at Bonavista on the night before polling, we can speak with even greater confidence. Messrs. Abbott, Coaker and Lloyd held a large meeting, where nearly 1,000 men were present. We saw the Hon. D. Morison there. We did not see the Hon. S. D. Blandford, but we heard after the meeting that he was present. The meeting was most enthusiastic and the cheering was frequent and prolonged. The speakers were Messrs. Abbott, Coaker and Lloyd. Not one word of reference was made to the Tory candidates. No notice of any kind was taken of them. No arguments of a lawless character were submitted, although the Minister of Justice was present, notorious for the lawless argument of Strong in reference to the sale of the Orange Bay property in which he was interested. We can state in conclusion that no cleaner campaigns were ever conducted on platform and in conversation than those conducted in Trinity Bay and Bonavista Bay by the Opposition candidates. Immediately after the meeting Messrs. Coaker and Lloyd left for the city by train. We repudiate the charge that either lawless arguments or anything else done by them led to the cutting of any wires. If Morison wants to know the reason of the unpopularity of himself and his government let him ponder over the facts which staggered ex-Governor Williams.

**AT THE CATHEDRAL.**—Rev. Dr. Greene occupied the pulpit at the R. C. 
