War News.

Messages Received Previous to 9 A.M.

NEW VICEROY.

LONDON, June 27.
 Official announcement is made today that the Duke of Connaught will be succeeded in Canada by the Duke of Devonshire.

SURPRISE TO CANADA.

OTTAWA, June 27.
 The announcement of the Duke of Devonshire's appointment comes as a surprise here. It was thought that either Lord Curzon or Earl Derby would be appointed. It was rumored early to-day that Derby would be selected, but officials refused to say anything definite. The Duke of Connaught and staff left on a western tour last night.

THE CASEMENT TRIAL.

LONDON, June 27.
 The prosecution closed its case in the Casement trial to-day. Sullivan, chief counsel for the defence, proceeded with an address, from which it is evident that the defence attaches greatest importance to an attempt to show that the indictment was faulty, inasmuch as it forced Casement's commitment for treason, by adhering to the King's enemies elsewhere, rather than in the King's realms. The matter was argued from every angle. No man could be tried for treason committed outside the King's realm. On many points the three judges entered into dissertations on the questions raised. When the Court adjourned Mr. Sullivan had not completed his argument, which will be continued to-morrow.

WILL ARBITRATE.

LONDON, June 27.
 The British and Swedish Governments have agreed to submit to international arbitration, after fuller question, the legality of British seizures of postal parcels, according to a Reuter despatch from Stockholm to-day. The British will, adds the despatch, submit to arbitrators other questions arising out of British prize court decisions, which have proved unsatisfactory to neutral governments.

HOME RULE RUMORS.

LONDON, June 27.
 Throughout to-day the air was charged with rumors of a serious cabinet crisis over the Irish Home Rule compromise. The fact that there were two prolonged cabinet councils in addition to party meetings, seemed to confirm this view. An evening newspaper announced that the Marquis of Lansdowne, Minister without portfolio, and Walter Long, President of the Local Government Board, had actually resigned, but their resignations had not been accepted. Rumor also connected the name of Lord Robert Cecil, Minister of War Trade, with the Ministers likely to resign. Earl Selborne, in the Lords, explained that nothing was expected to be announced definitely concerning the situation until after a meeting of the Unionists to-morrow, at which it was still hoped

that the influence of Andrew Bonar Law, Secretary of State for the Colonies, who supports Premier Asquith and Lloyd George, the Munitions Minister, who framed the Irish compromise, might possibly avoid a rupture. To-night it was announced that the Unionist meeting had been postponed until next week at the desire of Bonar Law and the Government, who wish for further time for consideration of the Irish proposal. This proposal puts a new complexion on affairs, and permits hope that a crisis will be avoided.

THE YPRES FIGHTING.

LONDON, June 27.
 An official this evening says: Last night southeast of Ypres salient a German attack was repulsed near the Ypres-Menin Canal. All along the front our patrols have been very active, entering the enemy trenches at numerous points, inflicting many casualties and capturing a few prisoners. Early this morning we successfully exploded two mines near Loos. In connection with one of these explosions the Leinster regiment inflicted many casualties on the enemy, during a successful raid yesterday. In the air numerous hostile aircraft encountered the enemy's side line. Five of our machines attacked four Fokkers, two of which were brought down and fell out of control. Two more enemy machines were driven down in the course of the day. Our casualties were one machine missing.

ATTACKING FORCES.

PARIS, June 27.
 The nine German divisions concentrated in a recent attack on Thionville, north of Verdun, have been definitely identified, according to a statement supplied from official sources to-day between Avocourt on the extreme right of the French front at Verdun and St. Mihiel on the extreme left. A total of 23 divisions as well as 61 Bavarian divisions have been identified, the statement adds.

AUSTRIAN COMMANDER'S PROCLAMATION.

BORDEAUX, June 27.
 The Montenegro Foreign Office, which is temporarily established here, to-day gave out a communication, stating that General Weber, the Austrian commander at Cetinje, had issued a proclamation to the effect that unless Mukotich, former member of the Montenegrin cabinet, surrendered himself within five days, his two brothers would be captured and hanged. At the same time an order was issued offering 50,000 francs each for Mukotich and his brothers. General Weber's action is said to be due to popular agitation on the part of Montenegrins against Austrian forces in occupation. A principal Montenegrin tribe has been fined heavily.

SERIOUS RIOTING.

BERNE, June 27.
 Reports have reached here that serious rioting occurred at Leipzig at the end of last week, and that about 1,800 shops, chiefly those of bakers, butchers, and provision dealers, were pillaged by mobs. It is stated that Czech soldiers, brought from Austria, fired on the crowds and that martial law has been proclaimed in Leipzig and the Duchy of Brunswick.

TURKISH ATROCITIES.

LONDON, June 27.
 Deplorable conditions prevailed in

Syria, said the Marquis of Crewe, in a statement dealing with the Arab revolt against Turks. A cordon had been drawn by the Turks around Lebanon district. They were starving the inhabitants of that district. Bearing in mind the fate of Armenians, he said, it was impossible not to feel the gravest concern for the fate threatening the inhabitants of Syria. The Turks exercised the greatest tyranny on Syrian notables, continued the Marquis, and had condemned twenty of them to death, and many others imprisonment or exile. He understood that representations had been made by the Washington Government to the Turkish Government, but it was difficult to say what further could be done. It could only be hoped, he added, that military successes which might be obtained in different parts of the world, might have the desired effect in this direction.

INTERNEED AMERICANS.

WASHINGTON, June 27.
 The British Consul at Chihuahua City, who is looking after American interests there, reported to the State Department to-day that the American troops captured at Carrizal, had been interned in the Chihuahua penitentiary, and were being well treated. He gave the number as twenty-three. Two of them sergeants, the others privates. They are slightly wounded.

RESCUE OF SHACKLETON PARTY SLIM.

BUENOS AYRES, June 27.
 Lieut. Sir Ernest Shackleton, whose efforts to rescue the body of his Antarctic expedition left at Elephant Island, proved futile, when the steamer furnished by the Uruguayan Government for the purpose met with adverse ice conditions, has requested the despatch to Elephant Island of the Argentine Antarctic steamer Uruguay. The Minister of Marine states, however, that it is impossible to send the Uruguay to the rescue of the Shackleton party, because she is not in a serviceable condition. No other suitable vessel in Argentina is available for the work. It is feared here that the chances of rescuing the party this season are slim.

FRANCE CONFIDENT.

LONDON, June 27.
 The French press and public is intensely interested in the simultaneous forward movement by the Italians and Russians, and current expression is assuming a tone of elation and confidence. The Temps, summing up the military situation, says: It is now the turn of the Germans to be harried ceaselessly with explosive shells. To-day they are no longer masters.

U. S. TROOPS ENTRAIN FOR BORDER.

NEW YORK, To-Day.
 At the urgent request of General Funston, orders were issued late to-night by Major General Wood, Commander of the Department East for Pennsylvania and the district of Columbia, for troops to entrain for the border at the earliest possible moment.

WASHINGTON, To-Day.
 Unless General Carranza surrenders the 23 American troops held at Chihuahua City before to-morrow night, President Wilson probably will go before Congress on Thursday and ask for authority to rescue them by force. Pending their release, the United States will not consider any order of mediation or arbitration. Prompt compliance by Congress with any request the President may make as to Mexico is foreshadowed to-day by the calm which prevailed in both Houses. Although designs to prepare for war were under consideration, and the corridors of the Capitol hummed with rumors, there was no excitement, and discussion of the subject on the floor was avoided.

ON ALL FRONTS.

NEW YORK, To-day.
 The Austrians in the region of Trent, are still falling back before the advance of the Italians who have recaptured numerous important points of vantage. The towns of Posina and Arsiero again have fallen into the hands of the Italians, while in the region between Adige and the Brenta Rivers numerous peaks and mountain positions have been retaken. The Austrians, according to the Italian War Office, vainly attempted to hold back the Italians by concentrated artillery and machine gun fire, but the Italians would not be denied. There has been again slackening in the intensity of the bombardment on the various sectors around Verdun. Only an infantry attack was attempted on Tuesday. This was launched by the Germans at part of the Village of Fleury, northwest of Verdun which is held by the French. It was repulsed. The Germans also essayed an attack against the British southeast of Ypres but this also was without result. In patrol engagements the British at many points entered the German trenches inflicting casualties on the defenders and making some prisoners. Four German aircraft have been brought down by the British airmen in aerial fights; the British lost one machine. On the front of northwest Russia, the Germans have bombarded the Russian positions and follows them up with infantry attacks. Petrograd says that all attacks were put down by the Russian fire. An official statement issued by the Russian War Office places the number of prisoners captured by General Brusiloff's army between June 4th and June 23rd at 198,972 officers and men. The number of heavy guns, machine guns and bomb throwers has reached more than 1,000.

MEXICAN DEMONSTRATIONS.

SAN SALVADOR, To-day.
 After a meeting to-night addressed by the Mexican Journalist Jose Colorado, on behalf of the Mexican attitude in the controversy with the U.S., a public manifestation took place in the streets of the city. Thousands of persons acclaimed Mexico and several prominent Salvadorians spoke in favor of the Mexicans.

FIRST ENCOUNTER.

MEXICO CITY, To-Day.
 There has been a clash between the Mexicans and Americans in northern Sonora, according to reports received from Brigadier General Callos, Military Governor of Sonora; no details are given. Later advices say two Americans were killed, at Agua Prieta and another American arrested.

MEDAL FOR WOMEN.

LONDON, To-Day.
 King George has ordered the military medal in future to be awarded

to women who have shown bravery and devotion on duty under fire.

LEE TO BE LLOYD GEORGE'S SECRETARY.

LONDON, To-Day.
 It is reported that Lieut.-Col. Arthur Hamilton Lee will be Lloyd George's Under Secretary for War. Col. Lee is now acting as Secretary to Lloyd George as Minister of Munitions.

MRS. THOMAS WINTER.
 At noon yesterday, after long suffering borne with the fortitude and patience that were part of her nature, Florence Winter, wife of Mr. Thomas Winter, of Rennie's Mill Road, passed away at the home of her sister, Mrs. Harry Winter, in Orange, New Jersey, U.S.A. Stricken suddenly last summer, Mrs. Winter was operated upon at the General Hospital here, but the utmost skill of our physicians could only afford her temporary relief. In January she went with her little daughter Florence to New York, where she received the best medical and surgical treatment in vain.
