15,000 BOLSHIEVKS CAPTURED.
LONDON, Oct. 7.
The capture of 15,000 Bolshievks
during the operations around Vorone-
zh by General Denikin's troops, is
claimed in a communique received
by wireless from the headquarters
to-day.

JOINS BOLSHIEV FORCES.

COFFENHAGEN, Oct. 7.
General Von Der Goltz, Commander
of German forces in the Baltic pro-
vince, whose activities there have
recently led to sharp exchanges be-
tween the Allied Powers and Ger-
many, has, with his staff, joined the
Russian Bolshiev forces, according
to a Berlin despatch to the National
Tidende quoting a report from a
Petrograd telegraph agency. There
is no confirmation of the report ob-
tainable here.

UNDER MILITARY CONTROL.

GARY, Oct. 7.
The site of one of the United States
corporation's greatest plants, affect-
ed for more than two weeks by a
strike in the Steel industry, to-day
was under military control of approx-
imately one thousand, one hundred
federal soldiers, commanded by Ma-
jor General Leonard Wood, command-
ant of the Central Department of the
army. Five hundred more troops,
fresh from riot duty at Omaha, Neb.,
were on their way here early to-day.
The call for federal troops was made
by Governor Goodrich of Indiana af-
ter thousands of strikers paraded and
held mass meetings after being for-
bidden by the Mayor. Police and
approximately three hundred state
militia men are stationed at Gary.

LATE STRIKE DISCUSSED.

LONDON, Oct. 7.
(Reuter's Ottawa Agency).—Lead-
ing labor men with whom the settle-
ment of the railway strike was dis-
cussed yesterday issued warnings
against the ending of the dispute, now
being regarded as final, and as ending
all the labor troubles. It is pointed
out that the protected strike of iron
moulders which is seriously affect-
ing the engineering industry of the
north, which is still unsettled there,
another disquieting incident, showing
that the temper of labor was still on
edge. It is particularly complained
of that the Govt. delayed putting into
operation the joint industrial council,
established at the beginning of the
year, to secure a universal living wage
and a forty-eight hour week. It is
expected, according to labor corre-
spondents, that industrial legislation
will form the future of the next ses-
sion of parliament. It is believed that
the Government is considering mea-
sures to develop the machines of con-
ciliation and industries, in order to
prevent strikes, probably by the crea-
tion of a system of arbitration courts
with a supreme appeal tribunal. Chair-
man Gosling, of the mediation commit-
tee in the recent railway strike, ad-
vocates a permanent central trades
union committee, empowered to deal
with the Government in all negotia-
tions. "Otherwise, he states, the move-
ment will break the bonds of chaos.
The result of Sunday's settlement of
the railway strike merely turned aside
the point of the wedge which labor
was ready to drive home." Hon. Mr.
Barnes, interviewed in regard to the
railway strike, stated that the impres-
sions that he drew from the struggle
was a revelation of the class solidari-
ty shown by labor and sense of re-
sponsibility displayed by them as citi-
zens. The general orderliness of the
men had been marked as the restraint
shown by the Government. The marked
strength of the new state re-
sources would in future have a mod-
ifying effect on extremists. The strike,
he stated, was needless and a wanton
attack on the well being of the com-
munity. The strikers could have ob-
tained all they have obtained by ne-
gotiation. The Government should
have been relieved of the settlement
of a dispute.

NEW LINE OF STEAMERS.

LONDON, Oct. 7.
Cork development association has
received a cablegram from Henry Ford
stating that he is considering running
line of steamers to Ireland.

night, Meyer Ellis, twenty years old,
of New York, died soon afterwards in
hospital, his opponent was Wilfred
Doyle, also of New York, who was in-
jured on a technical charge of man-
slaughter.

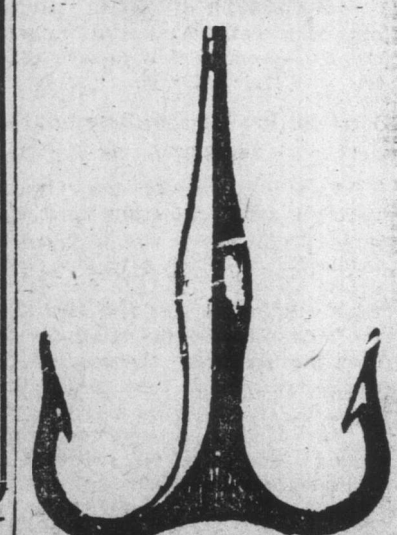
