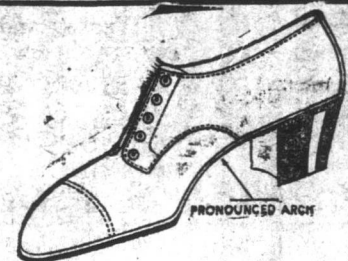

#### Our Dumb Animals.

Report of Chief Agent S.P.A., Week Ending July 6th.

Attended to the landing of two carloads of cattle at the Railway Station; all were in good condition and were taken to pasture shortly after arrival by Mr. Halliday. Also attended to two sales of cattle at Campbell & McKay's. Quite a number of people spect to the sheep having their legs cut while lying on the floor. Mr. McKay at my suggestion had the floor covered with straw for the sheep to lie on. Under present circumstances nothing more can be done. Received report of horses being on dry pasture without getting water; am attending to this. Had a horse owner summoned for beating his horse on the head with a whip handle. He was fined \$5 or 10 days, and he also received a severe reprimand from the Judge for his cruelty. Was asked by a lady to humanely destroy a very valuable Air-bell; it was in the habit of killing other motor cycles. The lady paid her membership fee to the S.P.A. I humanely destroyed a horse suffering from internal trouble. Mr. Smith ordered its destruction. The horse was owned by Mr. McGuire and was very old. Attended to the landing of 199 head cattle, 9 horses, 8 boxes of pigs and 31 sheep from the Sable I. All landed and properly looked after and

taken to pasture. Ordered three horses off the street for a rest. Attended to several minor complaints. Would specially request horse owners who have their horses on dry pasture to see that they have them watered on Sunday or I will have to take action.

Harvey & Co. agents and Furness Withy Co. agents and other steamer agents have been notified not to allow any bulls to be loaded on board their steamers unless with proper bull rings, or action will have to be taken to stop the present abominable practice of the use of lengths of twisted wire. During the week I have arranged with three West End butchers to use the Society's humane killer in their slaughter houses instead of the ancient and antiquated method of the pole-axe. These butchers have bought a killer for their exclusive use which shows a humane interest in their business and will result in better blood animals and better beef. #### Remains of Leonard Calvert

BELIEVED FOUND ON OLD ESTATE

Remains believed to be those of  
Leonard Calvert, first Proprietary  
Governor of Maryland and the son of  
G. Calvert, first Lord Baltimore, have  
been found by members of the South-  
ern Maryland Society in St. Mary's  
County. The remains were found on  
the Brome estate, on the edge of what  
was once St. Mary's City, directly op-  
posite St. Mary's Seminary and on the  
St. Mary's River. This is part of the  
old Leonard Calvert estate and the  
coffin exhumed was taken from the  
ground at a spot not far distant from  
the ground where the Calvert resi-  
dence once stood. Men installing pipe

connections in the Brome home made  
the discovery.

The coffin, which had evidently been  
prepared for a person of some dis-  
tinction, was in a state of decomposi-  
tion and contained a skull and human  
bones. Immediately after disinterment  
it was agreed that the bones were  
those of a Caucasian, this belief being  
prompted by the fact that the Indians  
never buried their dead in coffins and  
the further knowledge that the bodies  
of Indians were generally surrounded  
with trinkets of their tribe. Brass  
straps were bound around the coffin.  
Although there is no definite knowl-  
edge to that effect, it has been gener-  
ally accepted that the body of Leon-  
ard Calvert was buried on his own  
estate. It is known that the Calvert  
family maintained a private plot and  
that some men of prominence were  
buried on the grounds.
