GOVT. REQUEST VIEWS OF DISPLACED IN SYDNEY.

OTTAWA, Jan. 22.—Intervention by Federal authorities in the dispute between Cape Breton miners and employers will depend on the developments of the next few days. The Ministry of Labor has invited both sides to submit their views on the proposal to call a truce during which a Government investigation of the condition and merits of the strike can be made. The Minister of Labor said this morning that he hoped to get definite replies from Cape Breton shortly, meanwhile the Government cannot intervene in the matter of labor until invited to do so by one side or the other.
