

The cruises in August were to Mount Desert, Me . Boothbay Harbor to Boone Island, Me., and one to Nantucket Shoals, Mass. In September when two cruises were made—one to Mount Desert and one to Jeffrey's Ledge and Platts Bank-1.231.510 fish were tagged. The total number tagged this year is 12,-

Facts learned on these cruises reveal that in the region of Nantucket Shoals it appears that the presence of an abundance of all three species year to year. In 1923 cod were found to be very scarce in the early Spring, but abundant from August to October. In 1924, when the first fishing was done in July, fish were plentiful in mid-Summer, but there was a decided decrease in the Fall as compared with 1923. This year cod were found to be much more abundant in the early Spring than during that period in 1923, but were less plentiful this Summer as compared with 1923.

Haddock were very scarce on Nantucket Shoals during all of 1923, more plentiful in 1924, and at least ten times more abundant during the present year, based on the number tagged. Pollock were plentiful in 1923, particularly in the Fall, less plentiful in 1924, and about the same this year as last up to this time.

Lighter Golf Ball is not Approved

ST. ANDREW'S CLUB VETOES PRO-POSAL MADE IN RESOLUTION.

LONDON, Oct. 23-The proposal that a lighter ball should be played in the Amateur and Open Championships next year was rejected at the business meeting of the Royal and Ancient Club held in the club house at St. Andrews.

James Younger, of Mount Melville, captain of the club, was in the Chair at the meeting, and, at the suggestion of the Gold Balls Sub-Committee, the Rules of Golf Committee proposed

"The Championship Committee be requested to announce that in the Amateur and Open Championships of 1926 only a ball measuring not less than 1.68 inches in diameter and weighing not more than 1.55 ounces shall be played."

A large majority of the 150 members present found themselves unable to accept the proposal on the ground that the Championship competitions are held in order to select the champion of the day as ordinarily played, and that they should not be used for purposes of experiment.
