**The Murderess Campbell.**  
(From the Globe).  
London, June 19.  
By the courtesy of Sheriff Glass, our reporter had an opportunity of speaking to Phoebe Campbell this morning. She has not altered one whit from the time she was put upon her trial; her cheeks still retain their colour, and her demeanour is that of a person perfectly resigned to whatever fate awaits her. She says that she "does not wish to stay any longer in this world; she is in a happy state now, and is willing to die." She appears to be somewhat thinner than she was when arraigned; her hair is dressed in the same ringlet fashion as it was at the trial. She manifests no disinclination to see strangers, and in fact welcomed our representative in the most cordial manner, alluding to tomorrow's event as being a release from her worldly sufferings. The Rev. Mr. Richardson is attending to her spiritual wants, and is endeavouring in his efforts to prepare the unfortunate criminal to meet her doom. Coyne is still in goal, he still maintains the calm and indifferent demeanour he showed at the time he was in the witness-box. Mrs Campbell has expressed a wish to see him, and the Sheriff, by the instructions of the Attorney-General, will allow them to have an interview. Coyne in the most unobtrusive manner, when this information was conveyed to him, said "He didn't mind seeing the woman wishing her good-bye." Coyne says he is tired of being in goal, where he has lain for eleven months, and when told that Phoebe Campbell was to be executed tomorrow he manifested no emotion whatever, but appeared to take the matter as a foregone conclusion. He is cheerful, and while speaking a sort of half-sardonic laugh stole over his features, and there is a bold, confident look about the man that inspires more of the belief in his innocence than that of a wife plotting and murdering her husband a considerable amount of credence.

**Execution of Phoebe Campbell.**  
Speech by Mr. Mayhew.  
London, June 20.  
The murderess, Phoebe Campbell, executed her crime upon the scaffold this morning. The unfortunate woman was perfectly resigned to her fate, and seemed to be quite prepared for it. She spent her last night in religious exercises, in which she was assisted by several clergymen and some ladies, who since her condemnation have been endeavouring to bring about her release.

She felt not well for the scaffold, and a twenty minutes past eight o'clock, and walked steadily along the passage, and down the stairs, and on reaching the gate leading to the goal yard she shook hands with several persons whom she recognized and bade them good-bye in the most collected manner. The platform was the same upon which Phoebe was executed, and the executioner walked up the steps leading to it in the usual accustomed manner. He handed a phial of her to the operator, and she submitted to the process without exhibiting the slightest emotion, even watching the work as they were made fast about her person. She knelt down in the centre of the table, and the first stroke was immediately dealt. The drop fell apparently the longer as her feet nearly touched the ground.

She died without a struggle, resting in her hand a pocket handkerchief, which she expressed a wish to have buried with her.  
After lying about half an hour the body was taken down and placed in a shell for interment. The usual solemnity of an inquest was held and the verdict in accordance with the facts.
