London, Monday, March 3.

The first thought of those who project a rail-
road nowadays is "Will it be needed?" but "Will
it command a differential?" (Buffalo Express).
Up here in Canada, the first thought is
"When we get a charter, who will give us
the biggest price for it?"RICHARD HAWES, who was hanged at
Birmingham, Ala., on Friday, murdered his
wife and two children and ten people were
killed in an effort to take him from jail and
lynch him. [The foolishness of the would-be
lynchers is now apparent. Justice may be
slow "way down in Alabama, but it is
tolerably sure, as the recent hanging proves.BECAUSE the late John Jacob Astor left
\$750,000 for public and charitable purposes
in the city by the growth of which he and
his father made all their wealth, he has
been belauded by many newspapers as a
philanthropist. It must not be forgotten,
however, that after paying out the be-
quests, \$150,000,000 will be left for the son
of the deceased millionaire. If a man
worth \$150,000 were to die in London, and
leave \$750 to charities, would there be
much fuss about his benevolence?THE Hamilton Times asserts that for
nearly three months the molders of that
city have been out of work, a state of
affairs in marked contrast with the labor
market in Great Britain, where there is
actually a scarcity of tradesmen at the
present time. The Engineering and Min-
ing Journal says: "It is reported that the
application for skilled workmen is such that
the unions cannot supply all that are
needed. Overtime is very general in most
of the large works. The industrial con-
dition all over the world is exceptionally
good, and if prices are not pushed to too
good, and if prices are not pushed to too
high a figure, as they were in 1879-80, the
year 1890 will be one of the most prosper-
ous that this country has ever seen. Even
the voice of the croaker, with his old-time
lie of 'a million of men out of employment'
is no longer heard in the land."It seems decidedly unfair that in a
country where so many changes take place
in a year, the voters' lists should not be
revised every year. What crowds of people
would be without votes in municipal elec-
tions, for example, if the lists were left un-
purged and unamended for three or four
years, as were the Dominion lists, compiled to
suit the whim of the Tory bosses who dared
not trust the electorate. The Ontario
system, autocratic as it has held already
will be continued. It has already cost
the taxpayers over \$500,000, and to
reconcile them to it the Government says
that the revision will not take place yearly,
but be fixed by Ministers to suit themselves.
Mr. Platt, M.P., desires to let the public
know whether or not a revision may be ex-
pected in 1890, and will ask the question
to-night. If the answer is "No revision
this year," it may safely be taken for
granted that the next general election will
either be very soon, or postponed till there
is an opportunity to again gerrymander the
constituencies on the findings of the census
of 1891.MEN who take a contract to defend the
different parts of the Tory policy in
Canada, like a certain class of persons who
shall be nameless, should have long
memories. The other evening, the voluble
Mr. Hesson, of Perth county, argued at
great length in the House of Commons that
there had been no exodus from Canada to
the United States, but in the recent debate
on the contract labor law of the United
States he made four speeches to show that
the Dominion was losing thousands
of its best citizens through the enforcement
of that measure. As the Ottawa Free Press
points out, according to Mr. Hesson's latest
declaration Canadian workmen cannot find
employment on their own side of the line,
and so they give up their allegiance to the
country in order to get work in the United
States. Mr. Hesson complains bitterly be-
cause the Grand Trunk Railway Company,
a Canadian corporation, will not do some-
thing to keep its employees in Canada. Has
it ever occurred to Messrs. Hesson, Taylor,
Patterson, Ferguson, or Welland, and the
other complainants against the American
contract labor law that, to be consistent
and logical, they ought to rejoice at the en-
forcement of that law? asks our contem-
porary. They want Canadians kept at
home, and insist that times are better,
wages higher, and employment more easily
obtained in this country than in the United
States. If they believed their own asser-
tions they would be delighted at the en-
forcement of any regulation which will
prevent Canadians going to the United
States.The North American Commercial Com-
pany, which has been granted control of
the seal fisheries in and around Alaska, will
pay to the United States Government an
annual rental of \$60,000, and in addition to
the revenue tax or duty of \$2 laid upon
each fur seal skin taken and shipped by it
for each fur seal skin that shall be taken
and shipped. The company also proposesto pay 50 cents per gallon for the oil made
from seals that may be taken from the islands
and sold by it; also to furnish free of charge
to the native inhabitants of the islands an-
nually such quantity or number of dried sal-
mon as the Secretary of the Treasury may
direct, also to furnish, under the direction
of the Secretary of the Treasury, to the
native inhabitants the salt and barrels
necessary for preserving meat. It also en-
gages to maintain a public school on each
island for not less than eight months a year,
and to duly compensate the islanders for
all work performed. During the first year
the number of skins to be taken is limited
to 60,000, and in subsequent years the
Secretary of the Treasury can decide the
number. It is apparent that this official re-
mains pretty much boss of the situation.
There will be great temptation to "stand
in" with the monopolists. How the new
company will be affected by the regulations
that are expected to result from the preser-
vation of the seal remains to be seen.

NOT SO VERY PRAISEWORTHY

The Chicago Tribune is sounding the
praises of President Harrison because he
revoked the unjust sentence of a court
relating to a private soldier away up in
the wild northwest, and administered a
deserved rebuke to the officer who directed
the trial. We do not know what else the
President of the United States could have
done when the matter was called to his
notice. He did the least to be expected of
him, and he acted only after the Tribune
itself had most pointedly and elaborately
demanded intervention on his hands. More-
over, it seems that all the papers relating
to the case had been in the possession of
the War Secretary for two months without
being so much as looked into, and but for
the way the Tribune took up the cause of
the injured soldier and the political influ-
ences which were brought to bear through
the intervention of members of Congress, it
is not likely that action of any kind would
have been taken. The Tribune, of course,
triest to make it appear that the President
and his War Secretary have behaved in a noble
and manly way in the premises, but accord-
ing to one story it must be obvious that the
Secretary deserves censure for having ne-
glected the business a whole two months
after the report had reached him, during
which the soldier was undergoing punish-
ment, and that the President only per-
formed his simple duty when his duty was
pressed upon him by political friends.
In a country like Russia or Germany, where
officialdom is supreme, interference for the
protection of a private soldier or citizen
against the cruelty of court-martial, or
criminal courts, or official high-handedness
of any kind, might awaken surprise. But
in Great Britain, where the people are the
rulers, and officers of every degree from the
Queen, the President and the Governor-General
downward are the servants of the people,
the surprise should be to find a single case
in which the humblest of the people, whether
private soldier or private citizen, is per-
mitted to suffer wrong at the hands
of any member of the official class.

A WRITER in the Journal of Me

warmly advocates the adoption of the inter-
national language, Volapuk, for medical
purposes. Among the advantages of this
system, the writer mentions the abolition
of errors, and as being a language in
which, a London medical journal hastens to
admit that the presence of a declaration is
an obstacle to the diffusion of the lan-
guage, and that as the cases are said to
be of infinite shades of expression, as in

portant to medical writers who believe in
the establishment of that language—the

universal language. Terminal syllables
modify the sense of roots, but after the
roots have been learned, the modifications
must not only be learned, but understood.
