Ben Johnston, flagman at the Maitland street erossing of the G. T. R., perhaps owes his life to the fact that he has—or rather had—a cork leg. For or five years ago Mr. Johnson had his right leg amputated at the bridge near St. Thomas, while working on the railway and he has since supplied the deficiency by an artificial appendage. A few weeks ago he went to Toronto and bought a brand new cork limb of the most approved pattern; but not content with depriving him of the original, fate has been spiteful enough to even destroy the artificial substitute.

Last evening Mr. Johnsten, flag in hand, was standing on the south track at his crossing waiting for the 6:50 o'clock train from the east. He did not know that behind him three or four freight cars were being shunted by the yard engine. The yardman on top of the nearest car shouled to him to get off the track, but Mr. Johnston heard him not until it was within a foot of him. He dashed to one side, but the process of swinging the colk leg around was too slow. The limb was caught beneath the wheels and ground to atoms. The yardman expecting to pick up a mangled corpse jumped down to find most of the flagman lying beside the track and the cork part of him some distance away. Mr. Johnston's life had been in the greatest danger, as the limb was strapped to his body, and it was only by terrible effort that he saved himself from being dragged under the ears.
