RECEIVED BY THE POPE.
Rome, May 14.—The Pope received
in audience yesterday Right Rev. M.
E. Hawley, Bishop of St. John's, New-
foundland.

THEY STICK TO RHODES.
London, May 14.—A dispatch from
Cape Town to the Times says: Local
feeling is so strong in Cecil Rhodes' favor,
that if he were a candidate for
election here or in any other British
territory, he would head the poll.

ASHORE IN THE RED SEA.
London, May 14.—The British
steamer Woolwich, from New York,
April 5, for China and Japan, is
ashore on Shabakeer reefs, near
Jeddah, in the Red Sea. The British
steamer Mohammed is standing by
her, and there are hopes of floating
her after she had been lightened.

WILLIAM'S NEW BOAT.
Glasgow, May 14.—Emperor Wil-
liam's new yacht Meteor was launched
at the Hendersons' yard at Patric
kirk yesterday. After the launch, Lord
Lonsdale, who will represent the Em-
peror on board the racer, said that the
Meteor would possibly challenge for
the America's cup next season. If she
proves to be faster than Valkyrie III.

NINETY THOUSAND STARVING.
Letters from various parts of Tur-
key state that about 90,000 Armenians
in the Siwas Province are dependent
upon what is given them to keep
them from starvation. The destitu-
tion is increasing, and those who are
distributing relief should know what
further sums they may expect. Many
of the people are now eating roots.

DIVORCE SUIT.
London, May 14.—The divorce suit of
Mrs. Watt against her husband, Mr.
Hugh Watt, formerly a member of
Parliament and now a member of the
House of Commons, expressing his
conduct in the ground of cruelty and mis-
conduct, is exciting a good deal of at-
tention. Most of the leaders of the bar
are engaged on one side or the other.

WON'T OCCUR AGAIN.
London, May 14.—Right Hon. Joseph
Chamberlain, in an address at the un-
veiling of the memorial window in
Cordwainer's Hall, London, yesterday,
said that the "Che-Foo" case, which
has now formed the American
Colonies, by mistakes which would not
be repeated. Nevertheless, Mr. Cham-
berlain declared he was inclined to
think the loss a blessing to both na-
tions if, as he devoutly wished and
prayed, the two great Anglo-Saxon
peoples should go forward in contin-
ued peace and amity.

SALISBURY'S GOVERNMENT
SCORED.
London, May 14.—In an address at
Tredgar, county of Monmouth last
evening, Sir William Vernon Har-
court, leader of the Opposition in
the House of Commons, attacked
the government for allowing the re-
laxation of his membership in the
Privy Council by Cecil Rhodes, whose
conduct in connection with the recent
conspiracy in the Transvaal, the
speaker declared, had thrown the
whole of South Africa into a state of
confusion and danger. Sir William
also denounced the British South
Africa Company for retaining an agent
who had been shown to be guilty of
gross fraud.

THE RUSSO-BRITISH DISPUTE.
London, May 14.—In an editorial re-
garding the reported seizure of Che-
foo of land situated within the British
concessions, the Times says: "It is
inconceivable that the British Gov-
ernment should allow a man of Cecil
Rhodes' type to be a member of the
Privy Council by Cecil Rhodes, whose
conduct in connection with the recent
conspiracy in the Transvaal, the
speaker declared, had thrown the
whole of South Africa into a state of
confusion and danger. Sir William
also denounced the British South
Africa Company for retaining an agent
who had been shown to be guilty of
gross fraud."

SECRETARY LEYDS' STATEMENT.
London, May 14.—The Secretary of
State for the Transvaal, Dr. W. J.
Leyds, in his telegram to Governor
Sir Hercules Robinson, says: "The in-
vasion of the Transvaal was made by
officers and troops carrying the Char-
tered Company's arms. Even the spe-
cial prohibition of her Majesty's Gov-
ernment failed to prevent the in-
vasion. The moral of the incident
is that other powers dispense with
the extension of Imperialism. The
preliminary negotiations when they
want anything from China, and
threaten force. China knows that
they are in earnest, and yields. Un-
til we insist a similar convention in
the mandarin we shall always come
off second best where France and
Russia are our rivals."
