Transvaal War Is No Picnic!

Total British Casualties Reported by the War Office, 597,

Including 94 Killed, 490 Wounded and 13 Unaccounted For.

The Bombardment of Mafeking by Cronje's Men in Progress.

A Number of Houses Are Now in Flames!

A Missing Troop of British Hussars Out Their Way Through the Enemy's Lines and Join Their Comrades.

Pretoria, Oct. 24, via Lorenzo Marquez.—The bombardment of Mafeking by Gen. Cronje's command began this morning. The women and children were given ample time to leave the town.

The shelling of Mafeking was resumed at daybreak this morning. Several houses are in flames.

GENS. YULE AND WHITE IN TOUCH.

Cape Town, Oct. 25.—Evening.—It is officially announced that Gen. Yule is in touch with Gen. Sir George Stewart White at Ladysmith.

REPORT FROM GEN. WHITE.

London, Oct. 26.—The war office last evening made public the following dispatch sent by Gen. White from Ladysmith at 3:50 in the afternoon:

"The advance guard of the force sent out by me this morning to get in touch with and help Gen. Yule's column, was within three miles of that column, which had temporarily halted at Sunday River at about noon. I have occupied all the strong positions on the road to Ladysmith, and I have no further anxiety about them. I have received from Gen. Cronje's signalling officer of the Queen's regiment, who has ridden in, and also from Col. Dartnell, of the Natal Police, who accompanied the column, the best account of the spirits and efficiency of the troops, who are very anxious to meet the enemy again."

THE CASUALTIES.

The war office issued the following: "There is nothing to add to Gen. White's description of the engagement near Ladysmith, as given in this dispatch, except that we now learn the following casualties:

"First Gloucester—Killed—Col. Wilford. Wounded—Lieut. Hickie, Second Battery, Field Artillery; Lieut. Douglas, Fifty-third battery, Field Artillery; Major Aaby, Lieut. Perrau, Lieut. Hobart.

"Nineteenth Hussars—Lieut. Holford. The following casualties occurred among the non-commissioned officers and men:

"Nineteenth Hussars—Killed, 1; wounded, 3.
"Fifth Lancashire—Wounded, 1.
"Artillery—Wounded, 5.
"First Devonshire Regiment—Killed, 1; wounded, 5.
"Natal volunteers, Carbineers—Killed, 1; wounded, 10.
"Border Mounted Rifles—Killed, 2; wounded, 10.
The total number of casualties, as corrected, is: Killed, 13; wounded, 93; missing, 3.

"We learn from unofficial sources that the following officers, whose absence had not previously been notified to us, are prisoners in the enemy's hands:

"Eighteenth Hussars—Lieut. Col. Moller, Major Greville and Capt. Pollock.

"Dublin Fusiliers—Capt. Lonsdale, Lieut. Lemessurier, Lieut. Grimsdale, Lieut. Grimsdale, Lieut. Majendie and Lieut. Shore. The report of heavy losses sent from Rietfontein came as an unpleasant surprise, as Gen. White's telegram to the war office gave the impression that there was merely a brush.

GEN. SYMONS DEAD.

London, Oct. 26.—The death of Gen. Sir William Penn Symonds, the British commander at Glencoe, who was shot in the stomach with the bullet of the Boers there, was officially announced in the House of Commons today.

THE SITUATION.

London, Oct. 26.—The dispatches from the front are so diversified and contradictory, that it is difficult to outline the situation with any degree of exactitude. Three or four main facts, however, stand out prominently. Gen. Symons' fight at Glencoe was not anything like the decisive victory at first alleged, and Gen. Yule was in all probability have been annihilated, or have met with the same fate as the captured Hussars if he had not retreated. Gen. White's artillery duel at Rietfontein was a very severe engagement, in which the rifle did great execution, and in which success was only achieved at a distressing cost.

HUSSARS PRISONERS IN PRETORIA.

The bombardment of Mafeking has commenced, with unknown results, and the Boers have got their Hussar prisoners safely to Pretoria. Altogether, the campaign is being rushed by the Boers so strenuously and on such sound strategic lines that the situation of the British must in all probability give them cause for deep anxiety for some time to come. It is difficult to see how the concentrated force at Ladysmith will be able to take the aggressive immediately. Apart from the fatigue suffered by the troops, the Gordon Highlanders and Royal Rifles, have been practically without officers since the fight, and 135 additional officers have been ordered to leave England as speedily as possible. An official British account of

THE FIGHTING AT RIETFONTAIN, given out at Cape Town, says: "The enemy posted a battery two miles south of Mafeking, and opened with its heavy fire at long range on the British advance guard, consisting of the 19th Hussars. This was followed by artillery fire, directed with considerable accuracy against the British guns. An action lasting six hours ensued at Rietfontein farm. The enemy were driven from the hills commanding the roads. Sir George White's object being accomplished, the column returned to Ladysmith. The enemy is believed to have suffered. Several Boers were officially that they lost over 100 killed at Elandslaagte. Three hundred prisoners, wounded and unwounded, are in the hands of the British. Including several of high position. THE CAPTURED HUSSARS.

Pretoria, Oct. 26.—The British prisoners captured Friday near Dundee were trained at Durnhauser. They filled ten trucks. The officers traveled first class, and a separate van was provided for the wounded officers. An enormous crowd assembled at the station, here to witness their arrival, but there was no demonstration. When they alighted the prisoners were received with funeral silence upon the part of the crowd. The greatest order and decorum prevailed while they were traversing the streets. The wounded were taken to a hospital, while the other officers and men were marched to the racetrack, and escorted by mounted burghers, and were encamped on the spot where Jameson's troops were confined. The officers (Lieut. Col. Moller, Major Greville and Capt. Follock, of the Eighteenth Hussars, and Capt. Lonsdale, Lieut. Le Messier, Lieut. Grimsdale, Lieut. Grimsdale, Lieut. Majendie and Lieut.
