While searching Madison's farm for a quantity of apples, he discovered a pair of shoes which corresponded to the description of those stolen from Glencoe, and of which the high constable had been previously informed. Madison was forthwith arrested and brought to this city.

No trace of the apples was found. Mr. McKillop appeared for the crown, and the evidence of Precious was taken. He swore that to the best of his knowledge the shoes found in Madison's place were those stolen from his store in Glencoe. Mr. J. C. Judd appeared for the prisoner. Madison claimed no ownership in the stolen shoes whatever, alleging that they were the property of another redskin employed by him.

How should they know that Santa Claus, the wonderful old fellow whom their mothers have told them of, "has not yet learned the secret of how to bless men impartially?"

It is not the children of the absolutely needy who would thus wish the reindeer sled never jingle to the chimney-tops of their homes; for very often blurt old St. Nicholas is kind to such as these, and the reason is not hard to find. Cases of real poverty, where widows struggle to keep their families together, or where the breadwinner has been long sick and cruel want is evident—such cases are usually known to those societies or citizens whose great privilege it is to have the heart and the means to light up these homes with a new brightness. These children do not want Christmas to them the year's one time of abundant food and clothing and the playthings that all youngsters should find it. The children to whom Christmas is only another day of cold and hunger and privation live in the homes of men who work when they can, for their dollar or dollar and a quarter a day. Did you ever stop to think of the anxious care that honest men and brave women see in homes where there is evident such cases as these? It is not alone to the Christmas person to whom a full meal is welcome that happiness can be added, but that it is possible to brighten many homes where the line between luxury and necessity is so finely drawn that a five-cent doll or a bag of candy cannot be bought for the little ones, whose letters to Santa Claus are so many heartaches to their parents?

It is not an overdrawn picture. There are homes like these—many of them—and if a little thoughtfulness would give the keen edge of delight to their Christmas, it would not be the beneficence be like mercy "which blest him that gives and him that takes?"
