FRICITION IN THE EAST

Germany Opposes Reduction of European Force

At Tien-Tsin and Restoration of Chinese Control.

Auspicious Opening of the Colonial Exhibition at Dimsdale—Victoria's Grandchild May Rule Holland.

London, March 11.—A Pekin dispatch says: The policies of Germany and Great Britain in China, which Great Britain hoped had been consolidated by the signing of the Yang-Tse agreement a year ago, have developed an antagonism equal to that of Russia and Japan over Manchuria, and seriously evolving the interests of other nations. Germany is

refusing to agree to the reduction of the large garrisons the European governments are maintaining at Tien-Tsin and the restoration of the control of the native city of Tien-Tsin to the Chinese. The British diplomatists are trying to help the Chinese to regain the government of Tien-Tsin and the reason for the British action in blocking the payment of the February installment of the Chinese indemnity was to bring Germany to terms. The British diplomats regard the argument that the municipal government of Tien-Tsin by Europeans is a military necessity as a subterfuge, and in her role of protector of the Chinese against foreign aggression involved in the Anglo-Japanese alliance, and hoping to increase her prestige among the Chinese. Great Britain is helping them to regain Tien-Tsin. American influence is being used to the same purpose.

VICTORIA'S GRANDCHILD MAY RULE HOLLAND.

At the Hague, the engagement of Princess Alice Mary of Albany to the Grand Duke of Saxe-Weimar and Eisenach is to be announced soon. The grand duke is the richest prince in Europe. If Queen Wilhelmina has no male heir the grand duke will succeed to the throne of Holland. The princess is the daughter of Prince Leopold, Duke of Albany, fourth son of Queen Victoria, and was born in 1883.

THE COLONIAL EXHIBITION.

The Lord mayor, Sir Joseph C. Dimsdale, opened the exhibition of colonial products at the Royal Exchange yesterday. The exhibition occupies half the space. The high commissioner for Canada, Lord Strathcona and Mount Royal, made a brief speech. The Lord mayor referred to the exhibition as the embodiment of imperial patriotism. Lord Strathcona spoke on the great benefit to the colonies of such exhibitions.

It was the general opinion that the exhibition of gold and silver as Canada was very much inferior to that of Australia. The Lord mayor at the conclusion of the ceremonies, when passing out of the building, halted in front of a Canadian exhibit, remarking that it was apparently as luscious as the best English article.

ROSEBURY ON HOME RULE.

Lord Rosebery spoke for a crowded meeting in St. Andrew's Hall. He referred to the Irish demonstration in the House of Commons yesterday, announcing the capture of General Methuen, was greeted by loud Irish cheers, as a fresh indication of the impossibility of home rule. Lord Rosebery said that Mr. Gladstone himself, if he returned from the dead, could not dare to trust an independent parliament to men who were so violently opposed to a British military.

for police barracks died in the county of Tipperary. She had been rigidly boycotted after allowing the government to use her house. After her death no person would dig a grave, and the work was done by police. No one attended the funeral, but the woman's intimate friends and a few priests.

NO USE FOR WU.

A prominent Manchurian censor has memorialized the throne for the removal of Wu Tingfang, the Chinese minister to the United States. The censor writes that the Yang-Tse agreement, ostensibly for repairs to the Chinese legation in Washington, \$80,000 of the Tien Tsin silver refunded by the American Government. According to a dispatch from Washington, dated Jan. 23, Secretary Hay that day handed to Minister Wu Tingfang a draft on the United States treasury for \$75,000, the value of silver bullion captured by American troops at Tien Tsin. The Washington dispatch continued that as Minister Wu is charged with the payment of salaries of the Chinese consuls in the United States, and with defraying the expenses of the Chinese legations in Washington, Lima, and Madrid, it is believed the money will be applied to those purposes.

MISS STONE'S CASE.

It is specially stated at Washington that no demand has been made upon Turkey in connection with Miss Stone's case. The action taken by Minister Leishman, reported from Constantinople, was simply to conserve and rights which might be developed hereafter, and his note to the Turkish Government amounted to nothing more than a statement that the United States Government intended to make a thorough investigation of the incidents connected with the kidnapping, and at the conclusion of that investigation would look for redress to the party upon whose responsibility was fixed. It may be added that the whole trend of evidence so far is very strongly against the Bulgarians, and not against the Turks.

MORE EARTHQUAKES.

St. Petersburg, March 11.—More severe earthquakes shocks occurred at Shamanka, Transcaucasia, Sunday. About 12,000 persons are still destitute, as a result of the subterranean disaster, which occurred at Shamanka about the middle of February.

TRANSVAAL GOLD OUTPUT—CECIL RHODES.

The Transvaal Chamber of Mines reports that the output of gold from Witwatersrand for the month of February was 31,405 ounces.

Although no marked improvement is apparent in the condition of Cecil Rhodes, he was decidedly more cheery and talkative today. The cooler weather now prevailing is favorable to his recovery.

CABLE NOTES.

"Major" John McBride, who is now in Paris, says that when the Irish are at war with England they will use dynamite to blow up the British navy, but will not destroy bridges, or villages or innocent people.

Advices from Aux Cayes, a town on the south coast of Hayti, announce that nearly thirty citizens, accused of conspiring against the government, have been imprisoned, and that many others have sought refuge in various consulates. The other towns of Hayti are quiet.

The United States minister to Colombia reports under date of March 3 that during the preceding week the government troops had steadily advanced, occupying important positions near Bogota, which had been vacated by the revolutionary forces, who are understood to be in a desperate situation, and seeking an opportunity to escape.

Princes Luftullah and Sabahaddin, sons of Damad, Mahmud Fasha, brother-in-law of the Sultan of Turkey, and several other Turkish fugitives of lesser, have been sentenced, by default, to perpetual confinement in a fortress.
