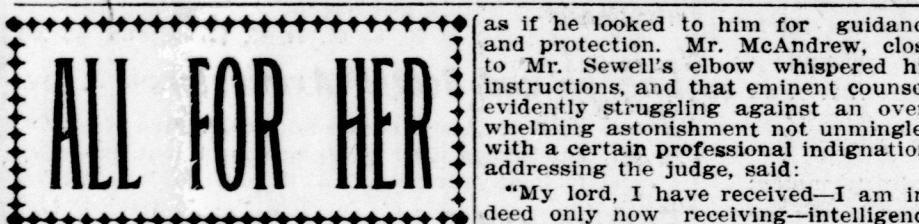

## LEAGUE MEETING AVAILABLE NOTHING

Nothing whatever was accomplished at a meeting of the Wholesale Baseball League held last night. Every vote taken resulted in a tie.

The meeting was held chiefly to wind up some matters relating to the season of 1904. There is a dispute between the McClary and Perrin Clubs over the possession of the Beck trophy, and Manager Smith, of the McClary team, proposed to discuss the question to a committee of citizens. No decision was arrived at.

Again, the McClary team is withdrawing from the Wholesale this year, having amalgamated with the McClary City League team, and it asked that it have the deposit made in 1904 returned. This, too, was undecided.

On the vote, the resignation of President Becher was not accepted. Action on the resignation of Ald. Matthews, as secretary of the league, was postponed.

## BOOKS ALREADY ON KING'S PLATE

Seagram Entry Is Thus Far the Lowest Priced—Offered at 3 to 1.

Probably in no place in Ontario outside of Toronto is more betting done on the King's plate than here in London. Every year numerous hand-books are made on the event, and it is likely that several will be made this year. Last year a large amount of money was won by the bookmakers, London going strongly for War Whoop, and took scarcely any notice of the Dymont string. Betting has already started, and tickets are being handed out. The Seagram entry is the lowest-priced so far, being offered at 3 to 1. ## TRIED FOR PLATE IN 1865, WILL TRY AGAIN THIS YEAR

Henry Chappell, Oldest Turfman in America, Has Two Entries for the Prize.

Buffalo, March 6. — "I know it all ways is dangerous to even hint that a Kentuckian ever by any chance isn't justified in any remark about racing that he may make," said Francis Nelson, steward of the Buffalo Racing Association, "but the talk about the Phoenix Hotel stakes being the oldest steeplechase in the world is a bit astray, unless you choose to disqualify Canada as having a right to be considered in America." Mr. Nelson has for many years been the sporting editor of the Toronto Globe, and with a loyalty worthy of any cause, sturdily insists that Canada is in America, and that when it comes to speaking of the oldest racing fixture it holds the record.

"Why," said he, "the King's Plate will in May next have its 56th consecutive year, and still is to remain an owner who ran a horse in the same event 40 years ago. This man is Henry Chappell, of Sandwich, Ont., and he had a starter in the plate of 1865. This, I believe, is a record without parallel on the turf in any country. Chappell is nearly 80 years old, and as enthusiastic today as when he wore colors in the plate of that year, would be hard to match even in Kentucky."

"He will win the plate of 1905," I'm sure I don't know, and if I guessed, every breeder in Ontario except the one I would mention would rise up and condemn me with reasons, all tending to show how impossible it is that I could be other than wrong about it. The Phoenix Hotel stakes is a grand old one, with a lot of associations that make its running glorious, but in age it is not in it with the King's Plate."
