PURE FOOD SHOW MAY 17 TO 26

Arrangements Made for Attractive and Interesting Exhibit at Princess Rink.

All arrangements have been made by the Grocers' Section of the Retail Merchants' Association of Canada of the city of London to hold a pure food show in the Princess Rink, commencing on May 17, to May 26, which will eclipse anything that has ever been shown in this city. In addition to food products which will be exhibited by the highest class of manufacturers in handsomely decorated booths, the committee have decided to engage the highest class musical talent, so as to combine instruction with entertainment.

The regular price of admission will be 25 cents, but 50,000 tickets will be distributed among the retail grocers, who will give them to their customers and friends, and which will admit adults for fifteen cents and children for ten cents any afternoon or evening.

The Dominion Secretary, Mr. E. M. Town, of the Retail Merchants' Association, of Canada, and who was secretary for the very successful Pure Food Show which has just closed in Toronto, and which attracted upwards of one hundred thousand people, was in the city yesterday, conferring with the grocers' committee here and giving them all the pointers he could to assist them.

The grocers are very enthusiastic in the matter and they say that they want to show the citizens of London what they can do when they get their shoulders to the wheel. We wish them every success.

COST WILL NOT EXCEED 45 CENTS

Vitrified Brick Pavement Will Be Laid on York Street West.

A deputation, consisting of Mr. J. H. Vanstone, Mr. Graydon and others, waited on the board of works last night in regard to the vitrified pavement which is to be constructed on York street, from Talbot to the river.

Mr. Vanstone said the people of the street are willing to have the improvement made, but they wanted some guarantee that the cost would not be charged 75 cents a foot, as was last quoted there, instead of 45 cents a foot, the price sent on the revised notices.

City Engineer Graydon gave the positive assurance that the people will not be compelled to pay more than 45 cents a foot, and perhaps only 40 or 41 cents.

"To be on the safe side, I have named 45 cents a foot as the price, but I hope to be able to build the pavement for 40 or 41 cents a foot," Mr. Graydon said. "This will cover the sinking fund and interest, too."

Mr. Vanstone made the suggestion that a rock seal pavement would do just as well for York street, and would cost much less, but the engineer said such a pavement would not do at all for the street, and the matter dropped.

The deputation, appearing satisfied, the board decided to proceed with the construction of the pavement in the usual manner.

It was also agreed to do all the necessary draining on the hill on York street at the expense of the city. This decision was reached on motion of Ald. Garratt.

Ald. Wyatt for a time objected.

"It is not fair to the people," said the latter, "to drain the hill at the general expense for the people of York street. When the Talbot street pavement was put down, the city charged the cost of the culvert at Carling's Creek to the new pavement, and made the people pay for it by a frontage tax."

As Ald. Wyatt did not press his objection, the motion of Ald. Garratt was adopted.

On motion of Ald. Saunders, it was decided to allow the paving of Richmond street, from the G. T. R. tracks to Horlans, Miss Taylor, and the street, to be done by the city.

A bylaw to establish certain newly-opened-up portions of Mary Place, Duchess, Mackenzie and Tecumseh avenues as public streets, was recommended to the council to be passed. All the new streets are located on the Mackenzie estate in South London.
