We have had the National League pennant cinched so long that it is not necessary for me to say anything about the sort of ball we have played, except that the general idea that we have been loafing is a mistake. Every man on the team has played fast ball whenever called upon, and every man on the team is in condition to play just as fast as if we had been in a race as close

I am glad we are going to play the Tigers, because the public, I think, picks that team as the most representative one in the American League, and we want to beat the best. Of course, every Cub player would have liked the White Sox to win, so that
