BRITISH PREMIER EDITOR CARMACK IN PEACE TALK KILLED IN DUEL

But Tells All and Sundry That the Great Navy Will Be Added To.

London, Nov. 9. — The Prime Minister, Herbert H. Asquith, was the principal speaker at the Guild Hall banquet tonight, which marked the inauguration of the new lord mayor of London, Sir George Wyatt Truscott, and brought to a fitting close the celebration of the King's 67th birthday.

The Prime Minister devoted his observations mainly to the European situation. After congratulating Turkey, in the person of the Turkish ambassador, Pacha, on the success of the most amazing revolution in the annals of history, he declared that, subject to the important principle that international treaties could not be altered except by the consent of all the signatories, the British Government had no prejudice against, or preference in favor of, any particular settlement. It had never objected to direct negotiations between Austria and Bulgaria, Turkey, as the most prejudiced, should have a settlement consistent with her honor and interests, and that the agreement must be countersigned by all parties to the Berlin treaty.

One of the happiest results of the Russo-Anglo convention, he said, was that both countries had been able to approach the near eastern question from the same viewpoint, and discuss it frankly and satisfactorily. The sudden crisis that had arisen, His Majesty's Government considered that Russia had behaved with the greatest restraint under exceedingly trying circumstances in following a policy of non-intervention in Persia. Just a year ago the German Emperor, who was on a visit to England, emphatically declared himself animated by a desire for friendship with Great Britain, and the maintenance of the peace of Europe.

"It was that spirit," said Mr. Asquith, "that guided all the negotiations between the two countries concerning the present difficulties, and, as I believe, the other powers are animated by a like spirit, the clouds that are now darkening Europe will soon dissipate, without a storm."

"There ought to be no talk of isolation, or of hostile grouping among the powers, or of the joint trustees of civilization and peace," said Mr. Asquith. "Mr. Asquith referred briefly to the commercial outlook and thought that if peace was maintained there was no reason why the present depression should be of long duration. Both the Premier and Reginald McKenna, first lord of the admiralty, dealt with the question of national defence, especially with reference to the navy. In most similar words, they decline to anticipate the next naval estimates, of the Premier hinted that the cost of the navy was not likely to diminish, but rather to increase, since having attained supremacy, the Government was firmly determined to maintain it. The navy, said Mr. Asquith, was now equal to any responsibilities that could be thrown upon it, but its indispensable superiority was not for aggression or adventure, but to fulfill the duty of protecting British commerce, industry and homes.
