He was tried in the King's Bench Division in London, in January, 1903, convicted, and sentenced to death, the sentence being afterwards commuted to penal servitude for life. On his conviction, the seat for Galway was, ipso facto, vacated. The imprisonment of Mr. Lynch lasted four years. The royal clemency was then extended to him, and he was released and restored to the full civic rights, of which he now aims to take advantage by again becoming a member of Parliament. 
