Ther majority of sales were made at \$12.50 a ton, while one load of choice hay went as high as \$13 a ton. A few loads of poorer quality went off at \$12. Butter continues its downward slump gradually. Butter and eggs were faifly plentiful. Creamery butter sold for 26 and 27 cents a pound. Dairy rolls are 24 and 25 cents a pound, and crocks 23 and 24 cents a pound.

Fresh-laid eggs are quoted at 20 and 21 cents a dozen. By the basket they sell for 19 and 20 cents a dozen, while the wholesale dealers are paying 19 and 1915 cents for crate lots.
