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SARNIA TYPHOID OUTBREAK IS GRADUALLY SUBSIDING

Chlorination Plant Is Purifying Water and Only a Very Few New Cases Have Developed Recently—The Schools Are Being Supplied With Water Brought From the Lake.

Sarnia, Jan. 3.—The typhoid epidemic, which has prevailed here for three weeks, is said by physicians to be gradually subsiding. Since the installation of a chlorination plant at the waterworks a week ago there have been scarcely any new cases, and daily tests by Medical Health Officer Poussette show that the supply remains free from colon bacilli.

The city council, at a special meeting yesterday, ordered an immediate repair of the break in the intake, which

is blamed for the epidemic, and a large force of men is already at work. Until the repairs are complete the water from the lake is being furnished to the public schools in town. The supply is brought by wagon from Point Edward.

The damaged section of the intake pipe has been located by divers, and contains four lengths, one of which has been pulled 30 feet out of place, supposedly by a boat's anchor. The pipe is badly corroded.

The report of the provincial health officer shows 14 cases of typhoid from Jan. 1, 1911, to Jan. 1, 1912. Ninety of these have developed within the past three weeks.

RUSSIANS EXECUTE HEAD OF PERSIAN SECT

The Wholesale Hangings Have Aroused National Feeling to Dangerous Degree.

Teheran, Jan. 3.—The execution of Shegah-ul-Islam, head of one of the religious sects, which took place at Tazir on Monday after a court martial by Russian officers, has deeply perturbed officials here. Seven other Persians were hanged at the same time, and there is apprehension that Russia's drastic and wholesale executions, which occurred during the most serious religious festival of the Persian year, will affront national feeling to a dangerous degree.

A MILITARY RIOT AT LONGMOOR CAMP

Soldiers Bombard Officers With Bricks When Holiday Was Curtailed.

London, Jan. 3.—An extraordinary military riot is reported to have occurred at Longmoor Camp, where there is a mounted infantry school connected with the Aldershot division. The Scotsmen among the troops on New Year's Eve became incensed at the curtailment of their holiday. It is stated that they snatched up the butts in the camp and bombarded the officers with bricks. The assembly was sounded by the bugler on guard, and all the officers and non-commissioned officers turned out to quell the disturbance, but the mutineers formed a square and kept off their superiors.

Some of the non-commissioned officers were injured by blows from belts and sticks. Eventually an officer, who is a noted boxer, challenged one of the men to fight. The men immediately formed a ring, and one of them stood up to the officer, but was soon badly defeated. Upon this, the men suddenly returned to the barracks. It is reported that one of the men was shot and seriously wounded during the affray.

NO BARRIER TO MISSOURI SCHOOL

Judgment Dismissing Application Permits Trustees to Go Ahead.

A LONG-DRAWN DISPUTE

Full Text of Decision as Handed Down By Mr. Justice Middleton.

As a result of the judgment of Mr. Justice Middleton dismissing the action for a mandamus applied for by the West Nisour school board to compel the erection of a continuation school, the school board will proceed at once with the construction of the building. The result of the suit vindicates them, it is claimed, and they may proceed at once with the work. There is a possibility of a further appeal, however, against the decision of Mr. Justice Middleton.

The action has been an interesting one, and much feeling was wrought up over the suit. It appears that before years ago, Inspector Thompson, of East Middlesex, asked the board of education of Thorncliffe to call a meeting at Thorncliffe to discuss the question of a continuation school. The board of education had gone over the matter, and approved of such a school in Nisour, owing to the fact that about 30 per cent of these passing the entrance continued at school.

The meeting was called, and after the question was thoroughly discussed it was decided to build the school. The county council was consulted and approved the proposal.

Re: West Nisour Continuation School.—A motion by the trustees for a mandamus to compel the township council to raise the sum of \$7,000 and pay the same to the school treasurer, or to issue debentures for the amount under bylaw 208, and to pay the proceeds to the treasurer. Judgment: This is an unfortunate contest between municipal council and a school board, in which the proper jurisdiction of the court is not clearly defined. PATRIARCH EXPELLED AND RIOTS FOLLOW

Serious Disturbances at Portuguese Capital, Clergy Being Forced to Flee.

[Canadian Press.] Lisbon (via frontier), Jan. 4.—Ensuing on the punishment of the patriarch of Lisbon, Mgr. Anthony Mendes Bello, who was ordered to be expelled on Dec. 28 by the Portuguese Government for two years, all the Portuguese bishops today proclaimed their independence from the Government. The Minister of Justice, in reply to a communication from them notifying their decision, declared that if they persist in their refusal to recognize the civil authorities they will all be expelled from Portugal. At the same time he will hold them responsible for any disturbances.

The expulsion of the patriarch of Lisbon caused disturbances in the capital today. Over 10,000 people proceeded to the patriarchate in order to offer their condolences to the departing prelate. The Extreme Republicans in the meantime organized a band of 4,000 men, who marched to the patriarchate and rushed upon the Catholics assembled there, shouting: "Down with the monarchists! Death to the clergy!" The Catholics responded with cheers for the Pope, for Don Manuel and for Don Miguel, as well as for the monarch.

The Republicans succeeded in breaking through the lines of police and soldiers surrounding the patriarchate, which they invaded, forcing the clergy to flee for safety.

A DYNAMITE MYSTERY

Men Were Charged With Killing Children in Order to Get Oil Lands.

Muskogee, Okla., Jan. 4.—The trial of the third of six persons charged with killing two children by dynamite to get possession of lands, worth \$250,000, ended yesterday, when F. L. Martin, a well-known businessman, was acquitted.

Martin, John Coombs, wealthy oil operator, and Wm. M. Irvin, businessman, with three negroes, were indicted in connection with the death of the children. Irvin was convicted of a few days ago and sentenced to life imprisonment. One of the negroes pleaded guilty and was given a life sentence. Coombs will be tried next week and the trial of the two negroes will follow. The children were killed at Taft, Okla., on March 23, 1911, by the explosion of dynamite placed under the house in which they lived.

THE PANAMA ROBBERY.

Bogota, Colombia, Jan. 4.—Dispatches from Medellin say that the men under trial there in connection with the daring robbery which was committed on Feb. 26 last at the offices of the Panama Banking Company, have been acquitted. The money found in their possession at the time of their arrest was returned to them by the court.

Vanderbilt, well known in mercantile circles in this city, surrendered himself at the criminal courts building late yesterday to face charges of embezzlement of approximately \$140,000 from the large wholesale drygoods house of Van Keuren & Thornton Company, of which he was treasurer and in which he held positions of trust ever since he entered its employ twenty years ago as a boy. Through counsel he waived the question of bail and entered a formal plea of not guilty. He was locked up in the Tombs for further examination on Friday.

LONDON OPERA SEASON.

London, Jan. 3.—Still another American is going to have an opera season in London, for Legrand Howland is going to take a West End Theatre, probably the Apollo, in the spring and will produce there several of his own operas, notably "Sarrano," which has already had 250 performances on the continent.

EICKHOFF PREPARED TO TELL DYNAMITE TALE

May Expose Men Believed to Have Been Associated With the McNamaras.

[Canadian Press.] Indianapolis, Ind., Jan. 4.—Though every effort was made by detectives today to hide the whereabouts of Frank Eickhoff, of Cincinnati, it was understood that he was in this city and ready to appear before the federal grand jury to tell his story about men alleged to have been associated with John J. and James B. McNamara and Orrie E. McManigal, in their deceptions over the country.

Eickhoff was a neighbor of the McNamara family in Cincinnati. He has been for weeks guarded by Detective Wm. J. Burns' assistants against contact with persons alleged to be interested in sealing his lips. It is known he is one of the principal witnesses relied on by the Government in its effort to expose groups of men in many cities charged with having furthered explosions against the property of employers of non-union ironworkers.

Interest in the reported business connection of Samuel Gompers and former Mayor Charles A. Bookwalter, alleged by Detective Burns to have significance in the latter's dropping his dynamiting inquiry two years ago, is following Burns to Philadelphia. He will arrive there late today, and it is believed will examine the labor union affiliations of Gompers, who prior to seven years ago, published a labor paper in Philadelphia. He is now associated with Mr. Bookwalter in the printing firm in which, according to Burns, Gompers was concerned.

FREIGHT PITCH-IN NEAR BROCKVILLE

No One Seriously Injured, But Rolling Stock Is Badly Damaged.

BORDEN FINISHING LAURIER'S WORK

Sir Wilfrid Penned Invitation to the King to Visit Canada.

CONS. CLAIM THE CREDIT

New Cabinet Busy Carrying On Liberal Government's Work and Monopolizing the Glory.

Ottawa, Jan. 4.—The Borden cabinet seems to be "finishing Laurier's work" in a most satisfactory manner, and incidentally taking the credit for it.

First came the reduction in cable rates across the Atlantic. This was inaugurated under the Laurier Government by Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux, yet the credit is all taken by Hon. L. F. Pelletier and the Borden cabinet. Indeed, to read some of the Conservative papers one would never think that it was Mr. Lemieux who first broached the question of cable rate reduction.

Then came the return of the subscription made by the city of Quebec towards the construction of the Quebec bridge. This was arranged by Hon. G. P. Graham as part of the recasting of the plans for the new structure. Yet the credit for the payment of the money back to the city is being claimed by Hon. L. F. Pelletier, as the minister representing the Quebec district.

And now, to crown the completion of Laurier's work, comes the announcement that his Majesty the King has accepted the invitation extended to him by Sir Wilfrid Laurier to come to Canada and open the new Transcontinental Railway in 1914. Here again all the credit is being taken by the Borden cabinet, though the idea was Sir Wilfrid's, and it was he who personally when he was in England last summer the letter that invited the sovereign to visit Canada.

It is only natural that the new Government should complete the work left unfinished by the Laurier Government, but it might have been better to give the credit where it is due instead of taking to itself the honor of initiating policies which it is merely carrying out as legacies from its predecessor.

King George comes to Canada two years hence, as all hope he will, it will be due to the invitation of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, and to nothing else.

DRIVEN INTO STREET BY MIDNIGHT BLAZE

Dozens of Winnipeg Families Have an Uncomfortable Experience.

[Canadian Press.] Winnipeg, Man., Jan. 4.—With the temperature 30 below, dozens of families were driven from their homes last night when the Excelsior Garage was destroyed by fire as the result of a gasoline explosion. The Charles Sharpe terrace also was burned. The loss is \$105,000, partially covered by insurance. Twenty-five fine automobiles were burned.

The flames burned to within a few yards of Premier Roblin's residence. The Premier took a crowd of those driven from their homes into his house.

WOMAN FOUND DEAD IN LUXURIOUS HOME

Plenty of Money in Bank, But Not a Morsel of Food in the House.

There was not a morsel of food in the house and no evidence of a recent fire. The woman is not known to have entertained more than one caller, a nephew in ten years. Her house is valued at \$10,000, and she had an account at a local bank. The police are endeavoring to find relatives.
